King Passes Fair Night;  
No Change In Condition

London, Jan. 7. (UPI)—Another European nation has forsaken democracy in favor of one-man leadership.

The seizure by King Alexander of Jugo-Slavia for supreme power in that country makes him the first modern crowned dictator and is another step in the post-war disintegration of Democratic parliamentary government in Europe. The process has been going on for the last ten years, so that approximately seven-tenths of Europe has abrogated parliamentary government for some form of personal dictatorship.

In effect, the answer seems to be that the European does not want to rule, but rather be ruled. France, England and Germany still hold to popular government, but Italy, Spain and Russia, Hungary, Turkey, Bulgaria, Rumania, Poland, Albania and now Jugo-Slavia have turned to a dictatorship or semi-dictatorship.

Chicago, Jan. 7. (UPI)—Chicago Heights, built by steel and demoralized by alcohol, awoke today to find its leading gangsters in jail, its police department under fire and its entire local government temporarily dispossessed by a combination of federal and county authorities.

In the most spectacular raid in the history of Illinois, the town of 25,000 inhabitants, birthplace of gangland and scene of scores of gang murders, was virtually sacked by 12 squads of Chicago police and 100 federal agents who swept through its business and residential districts seeking the fountain heads of vice and crime which have made the suburb more notorious than Cicero.

The 25 men seized in the raid had been marked for arrest by government agents and by Chicago detectives. They included Oliver J. Ellis, alleged payoff man for a liquor and slot machine syndicate which controlled millions of dollars in gambling concessions in the steel town. There were racketeers and beer chieftains said to be underlings of "Scarface Al" Capone, lord of Chicago's gangland, whose virtual rule of Chicago Heights has existed since the abdication of the notorious Johnny Torrio.

Washington, Jan. 7. (UPI)—The U. S. Steel Corporation, one of the world's largest industrial concerns, will receive from the Federal Reserve Bank in New York today a check for \$26,000,000.

Transfer of the check is a return to the steel corporation of money it paid to the treasury department in excess of the taxes legally due. The check is the largest refund ever made by the treasury, experts in the bureau of internal revenue said today.

A \$5,000-a-year disbursing clerk signed the huge check and arranged the transfer to the New York reserve bank. Tax refunds, the treasury explained, are usually made through the collector of internal revenue in the district of the firm receiving the payment.
