BLACKMER'S Refusal To  
Return Home Costs Dearly

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—(UPI)—Refusal of Harry M. Blackmer, Denver oil millionaire, to return from Paris to testify in the Sinclair-fall and Sinclair teapot dome trials, has now cost him \$200,000.

U. S. Marshal Snyder has taken over a second \$100,000 from Blackmer's attorneys, under the Walsh law providing for seizure of this amount from recalcitrant witnesses. If the contempt of court charge is upheld, the money will be confiscated.

Blackmer has appealed the judgment against him on the first seizure, so the amount will not be turned into the treasury until a final ruling on the law, probably by the supreme court, is reached.

STUDENTS PAY  
VISIT TO U. S.

## Party Of Forty-one Will

Spend Month In East-  
ern Cities

New York, Jan. 8—(UPI)—Forty

South African students, invited to this country by the National Student Federation of America, will arrive today on the S. S. Adriatic. The party will visit New York City for six days and then go to Washington, Chicago, Detroit, Buffalo, Montreal, Toronto and Boston, and return to New York for a second five-day period before sailing on the Cedric on February 2nd.

The South African party includes 26 girls, 13 men and 2 chaperones. They are all of Dutch, English or French descent and represent seven colonies.

The students are sent on this tour by the National Union of Students in South Africa, an organization similar to the N. S. F. A. in this country. Both of these students organizations belong to the International Confederation of Students uniting the students of more than 30 countries.

The purpose of the tour is to introduce South African students to the best of American college and home life, and also to show them something of the industrial and civic life of the United States. The visitors are to be accommodated at hotels, University dormitories and private homes. Receptions, dinners and dances have been planned for the group as a whole and also for small parties of half a dozen students.

Indianapolis, Jan. 8.—(UPI)—Changing the name of the Indiana state normal school, Terre Haute, to Indiana state college for teachers and the Indiana state normal, (eastern division), Muncie, to Ball Teachers college is expected to be approved by the legislature trustees of the institution attending a meeting here, they declared.

Plans were also announced for construction of a new teacher training building at Terre Haute. Money for the building and grounds will be derived from the 2-cent special school building levy made by the 1927 legislature. It provides for construction at both the normal schools and Purdue and Indiana universities.
