TOTALING \$3,000**

**Search For Missing Terre
Haute Girl Continues;
Clues Exhausted**

Terre Haute, Ind., Feb. 2.—(UP)—
The search for pretty 10-year-old Edith
Mae Dierdorf, who disappeared from
here Sunday was continued today with
rewards totalling nearly \$3,000 offered
for her return dead or alive.

One man, Harry Daniels, Chesterton,
Ill., who police were tipped might have
had some connection with the little
girl's disappearance, proved to have
no knowledge of the case. Local author-
ities went to Chesterton yesterday but
returned and said he had convinced
them he knew nothing of the case.

He admitted however, that he had
been in Paris, Ill., which is near west
Terre Haute.

Police here said that they have ex-
hausted nearly every clue which has
been given them and that the search
now depends upon new clues which

they intimated they might receive to-
day.
