FAILURE OF ONE
FORCES OTHERS
TO CLOSE DOORS

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE)

The condition of the Wells County
bank is due in a large measure to the
lack of confidence upon the part of
citizens of the community as the re-
sult of local experiences following the
failure of the Studebaker bank here
two years ago, Mr. Waugh said.
"The closing of the bank followed
the depletion of the cash resources by
steady withdrawals, the money
being used to purchase bonds in
which the purchasers had great
faith," Mr. Waugh said in a state-
ment for his board of directors.

"The bank could not force collec-
tions on loans fast enough to meet
this condition. The directors decided
that the bank should be closed be-
fore the deposits were seriously de-
pleted."

Mr. Waugh said it was the hope
of the directors that the bank would
be able to pay close to 100 cents on
the dollar to depositors.

Chartered in 1888
The Wells county bank was char-
tered in 1888. It is capitalized at
\$100,000. Its surplus is given as \$50,
000 and its deposits at \$1,250,000.

The officers of the banks are E.
B. Williamson, president; R. S. Mor-
row, vice-president; P. C. Waugh,
vice-president, and R. N. Fitzpatrick,
cashier.

The officers with David Meyer,
John H. Painter, Frank Engeler,
Samuel Hitchcock and John E. Stur-
gis compose the board of directors.

Representatives of the bank were
in Fort Wayne Tuesday, in an effort
to secure financial aid which would
make the continuation of the opera-
tion of the bank possible, but they
were unsuccessful.

The exact condition of the bank
will be determined by an audit.

Trust Company Sold
Fort Wayne, Feb. 13.—The Lincoln
National Bank and Trust company
interests of Fort Wayne yesterday
completed negotiations for the pur-
chase of the controlling interest of the
capital stock of the Union Savings
and Trust company of Bluffton, the
only banking institution remaining in
that city following the closing of the
Wells County bank.

directors of the Union Savings and
Trust company.

Immediate steps will be taken to
enlarge the banking quarters so as
to give an adequate banking home
to the new institution which will give
service to Bluffton, Wells county
and the surrounding community.
