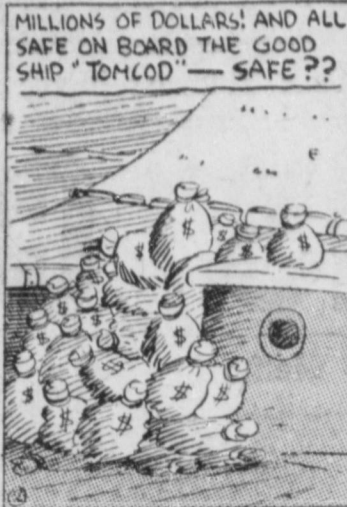

Cleveland, O., Mar. 28.—(UP)—The Cleveland Rosenblooms held a substantial lead in the series for the professional basketball championship today, having defeated the Fort Wayne Hoosiers here Wednesday night, 24 to 17. The teams, winners of the "split season" races in the American Basketball league, will meet here tonight and then move on to Fort Wayne.

The Hoosiers led throughout the first half last night and at the end of the first period were leading, 8-6. They increased their lead to 12-8 in the second half. Then the Rosenblooms staged a sensational rally, scoring 12 points while holding the Hoosiers to one marker, to give them a lead of 20-13. Fort Wayne rallied late in the game, but was unable to overcome the Cleveland lead.
