Oslo, April 9.—(U.P.)—The Norwegian press and public have joined in a demand that the government "proceed energetically" after carefully investigating the shelling of the steamer Juan by a United States coast guard cutter in Chesapeake Bay, near Baltimore.

Indignation has been expressed freely since the incident occurred. However, the government is awaiting the report of the Baltimore consul and announced it would take no action until the report was received.
