Sues For Possession

Earl and Roscoe Hough have filed a suit in circuit court against Ivan E. and Wilma Hough, seeking the forfeit of a lease for waste and for possession of real estate. It is alleged in the complaint that the plaintiffs leased a 51-acre farm in Wabash township to the defendants in February 1927. It is further charged that the defendants wrongfully maliciously and without authority removed all electric light fixtures from the buildings on the farm, removed the hay rope from the barn and removed several rods of wire fence from the premises and converted the same to their own use, all to the damage of the plaintiffs to the extent of \$200. Nathan C. Nelson, of Decatur, is counsel for the plaintiffs.
