Suspicious Character Is Wanted On Murder Charge

Indianapolis, July 22.—(U.P.)—Harvey Decker, 23, Rocky Branch, Ky., arrested here last week as a suspicious character, will be returned to Kentucky to face a murder charge, police said today.

Decker was alleged to have admitted to Indianapolis detectives he shot and killed his uncle, Luke Gregory, Whitney City, Ky., a week ago last Saturday, when Gregory threatened him with shotgun. Decker is alleged to have confessed shooting his uncle with a revolver, after which Gregory's wife seized a shotgun and fired at Decker, but missed.

U. S. Farm Profits In 1928 Greatest Since War

Washington, July 22.—(U.P.)—American farmers reaped greater profits from the soil in 1928 than in any previous period since the post war agricultural slump, the agriculture department has announced after surveying data gathered from 11,000 farms.

These farms showed an average net return of \$1,334 last year compared with \$1,299 in 1927 and \$1,183 in 1926, the department said.

From the gross profits of each farm the department subtracted \$1,359 to obtain the net return. Of this amount it was estimated farmers spent \$1,000 for necessities and consumed home grown foods valued at \$269.

Aged Man And His Wife Found Murdered

Barbourville, Ky., July 22.—(U.P.)—An aged man and his wife were found murdered in their home here today, apparently the victims of robbers.

The couple, James Foreman and his wife, May, had been shot and their heads battered in with an axe handle.

Foreman was reputed to have kept large sums of money in the house.
