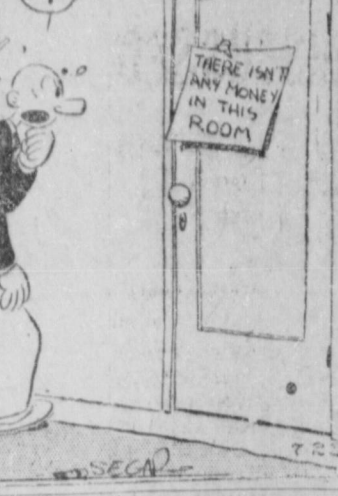

NOW SHOWING—"TELLING THE WORLD"

HOLLYWOOD'S
FILM SHOP

Hollywood, July 23—(UP)—The multitude of problems of soundstage recording having nearly all been solved by technicians and acoustic experts the movie makers are turning their attention to the subject of maintaining sound locations for screening talking pictures on distant locations.

The practicability of including the great outdoors in the talkie sphere was demonstrated by "In Old Arizona." But successful as the picture was, the fact remained that it represented, technically, merely a primitive experiment with portable recording apparatus.

In filming "College Days" for Metro-Goldwyn Mayer, Director Sam Wood conquered formidable obstacles in the way of recording dialogue among city traffic and crowd noises. He even went to an old location site in the Verdugo Woodlands and captured charming spoken love scenes with babbling brooks, warbling birds and rustling trees and a background.

All of this was done with improved portable equipment housed in large motor trucks and with microphones adjustable for sound "focusing" to shut out unwanted condensations and refractions of air vibrations which confuse the dialogue.

Now it is planned to wire the woodland location and other sites used almost continuously by various companies at fixed rental fees, upon the same plan as a telephone switchboard. As a result, any studio, by paying ordinary telephone line charges will be able to make talking pictures with the connections running back directly to the studio recording rooms, and to obtain instantaneous "play backs", which save enormous expenditures in retakes.

In order that talkies may be made at sea, M. G. M. has purchased a huge sailing schooner and outfitted it as a floating studio, complete with electric generator and incandescent lighting equipment.

Talkie equipment was built below decks on the vessel, first to be used for the Charles Brabin production, "Ordeal." Another ship, an ocean tramp, will be launched as a talkie ship for John Gilbert's "Way For a

Sailor."

Because it is used as a location site for film companies, especially during the playing of big football games the Los Angeles Coliseum will be wired and newsreel cameramen and feature length picture directors may grab off whatever sound shots they want without any more equipment than a "mike" with a plug-in cord and an operator.

One of the most ambitious sound recording locations attempted is the African wilds, where W. S. Van Dyke is directing the filming of "Trader Horn." He does not plan to record his picture in dialogue but intends to get the roars of the jungle beasts and native songs and music for synchronization.

It is the opinion of sound experts that it is merely a matter of time until direct recording connections will be possible from any point where a telephone is available. The old theory that talking pictures could be made successfully only on a sound proof stage appears definitely blasted and soon talkies companies by scores will be "on location."
