Russian Patrol Fired On

Moscow, Aug. 10.—(U.P.)—An incident in which a Russian patrol was fired upon with fatal results along the Amur river, dividing Siberia and Manchuria, was announced officially today.

Leo Karakhan, assistant foreign commissioner in charge of eastern affairs told United Press he had received a cablegram saying that Russian "White" guards on the Chinese side of the river near the village of Tcherniavo area, fired, killing two of a Soviet border patrol and wounding eight. The Soviets immediately sent a small detachment of troops in a boat to prevent a repetition of the incident, Karakhan said.

FOREST FIRES ARE UNABATED

blaze is six miles from any road and supplies must be packed in to the crews of the fire fighters.

A firebug or a careless camper caused the blaze, which is the worst in Oregon but not in the northwest. In Ranier National park, Washington, a marooned fire fighting crew which took refuge yesterday in a rocky canyon as the roaring flames forced them to flee, today was believed to be out of danger. Efforts were being made to drop food and water to them from airplanes.

The fire which the marooned men were fighting, as a small unit of a large contingent, was still sweeping through virgin forest on the slopes of the northwest's highest and most majestic peak.

FIRES RAGE ON

San Francisco, Aug. 10.—(U.P.)—While the forest and brush fire situation in northern and central California was regarded as considerably improved today, authorities were questioning four new men about origination of several blazes.

Only one fire troubled forestry officials. It was in San Luis Obispo county and had destroyed about 30,000 acres of grazing land. However, portable radio sets had been installed for direction of 300 fire fighters and control of the conflagration before nightfall was considered possible.
