RAINY WEATHER
VISITS COUNTY

Farmers Say Rainfall Will
Not Be Harmful Unless
It Lasts Too Long

Rainy weather and predictions of
slightly warmer temperature faced
Decatur and Adams county today after
several days of chilly fall weather. Farmers
of this community say that rain,
at the present time, will do any harm to crops, unless there is too much.

Many local residents say that rain is
needed. After the long drought cisterns
are almost dry and many residents
have been forced to turn city water in-
to their soft water tanks.

Roads have been covered with a
deep coat of dust and the rain will
temporarily settle them. The rain will
not harm the beet sugar crop, it was
stated today, unless a long rainy sea-
son sets in, making it impossible for
farmers to get their beets out of the fields.

State weather forecasters stated to-
day that the rain probably would last
several hours and that after a slight
rise in temperature, the thermometer
would drop lower.

FARM VALUES
ARE INCREASED

Well-Known Decatur Auct-
ioneers Says Values Are
Rising At Rapid Rate

Farm values are steadily improving
according to reports from Col. Fred
Reppert and Col. Roy Johnson of the
National Reality Company of this city
who have recently conducted a number
of successful auction sales. During
the last week they report these:

Sale of 160 acres near Nappanee,
Indiana at \$117 per acre, also large total
for live stock and personal property.

Sale of 153 acres near Shipshewana,
Indiana at \$125 an acre, all personal
property and 35 head of Guernsey cat-

tle. The average for the cattle was
\$232 a head, one bull selling for \$1,010
to Giltman Brothers of Camden, Michigan.

Col. Roy Johnson, who is being rec-
ognized as the "ace" dairy cattle auction-
eer salesmen of the middle west,
has just returned from Lake City,
Michigan, where he conducted a sale
of Jersey cattle which brought an aver-
age of \$107. On October 9, he will con-
duct a sale of pure bred milking short
horn cattle at the Cincinnati stock
yards and on October 15 a sale of regis-
tered Holsteins, 80 head, at Albany,
New York. On October 28 he will hold
a pure bred Guernsey sale at Owasa,
Michigan.

His sales this year have been the
most successful of his career. He de-
clares there is no doubt that farm val-
ues and farm products are coming
back rapidly and the outlook is splen-
did. "The swing is undoubtedly up-
ward" said Mr. Johnson this morning,
and I am confident, the farmer will
soon come into his own again.
