Marion County Deputy Discharged From Service

Indianapolis, Oct. 14.—(UP)—Elmer E. Petty, deputy sheriff of Marion county, convicted by a criminal court jury of driving an automobile while intoxicated, has been dismissed as a member of the sheriff's force, it was announced today.

Petty has been an active worker in the Republican party. The Republican city chairman has indicated he will also be removed as ward chairman when sentence is formally passed.

In the first trial three weeks ago the jury failed to agree.

Chicago, Oct. 14.—(UP)—Willie Doody, dapper, wizened bandit who led the Chicago police a merry chase for weeks, went to trial today on charges of murdering a policeman.

In starting selection of a jury state's attorneys demanded the death penalty for the bandit who has admitted a long string of robberies but denies the murder of police chief Maurice Levy of

Berwyn, who tried to arrest him at the height of the search.

Doody, who was captured in a west side flat, by a large squad of police without a fight despite his many

threats, was in the court room as the trial started. Despite the fact he has been in jail for months, he appeared fresh and was dressed in up-to-the-minute styles.

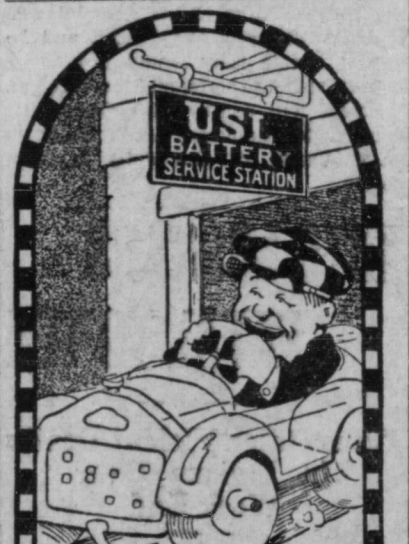
