Queen Leaves CastleBerlin, Nov. 2—(UP)—Report re-
ceived here today from authoritative
sources in Bucharest said that Dow-
ager Queen Marie of Roumania had
left from the Royal palace at Balchik
because of dissension in the royal fa-
mily.Rumors of strife between the Dow-
ager Queen and others of the family
have been current for some time. It
was declared that several of the family
were opposed to her inclination to in-
terfere with the regency which pre-
sides over Roumania on behalf of her
grandson, the Boy King, Mihai I.Each convention only becomes ap-

BUILDS SET OF
CODIFIED LAWSTwenty-Nine International
Conventions Launched
In 11 YearsBy Henry Wood
(United Press Staff Correspondent)Geneva, Nov. 2—(UP)—As a result
of the creation under the Versailles
treaty of the International Labor Bu-
reau, labor is steadily building up a
vast body of codified international
law on its behalf.Since the first International Labor
conference at Washington in 1919 a total
of 29 international conventions have
been adopted on behalf of labor have now been
launched.As the ratifications of these are reg-
istered with the League of Nations
and a provisions in all are made for
appeal to the League and as provi-

Hague for interpretation of disputes
arising under them, they constitute in
the present recognized sense of the
