HAMILTON CASE NEARS FINISH

District Attorney Completes Rebuttal Argument in Texas Murder Trial

Weatherford, Tex., Nov. 5.—(UP)—The story of a messalliance which began with the secret marriage of Tom Walton, Jr., 21, son of an innkeeper, and Theresa Hamilton, 17, daughter of an ex-college president and ended when Walton was killed in the office of Theresa's father, Judge R. H. Hamilton, was almost complete in court records here today.

Names of a dozen persons high in the state's judiciary, the church and the schools have been entered in the case wherein Hamilton is being tried on charges of having murdered Walton when the latter came to his law office some time after the wedding.

District Attorney Edward W. Thomsen was expected to complete rebuttal testimony today and court officials believed final arguments would begin before tonight's recess. Probably sometime Wednesday the jury will file out with the plea of self defense from Hamilton's lawyers to be considered on one hand, and the demand for a death penalty by the prosecution on the other.

Thomsen began the calling of rebuttal witnesses Monday after the first week of the trial had been devoted to the prosecution's opening testimony and the examining of defense witnesses.

Orville Hinkle, a bank cashier at Amarillo who lived at Mrs. Walton's inn testified Hom Walton had telephoned Judge Hamilton before he went on the fatal visit to the judge's office.

"Tommy came back and said 'He hung up on me,'" Hinkle testified. "Then he left. The next thing I heard was the ambulance siren. Fifteen minutes after Tommy left, I heard he had been killed by Judge Hamilton."

Chicago Sanitary Board Member Dies of Pneumonia

Chicago, Nov. 5.—(UP)—Death, brought on by worry over the bombing of his home last December, claimed Lawrence F. King, 42, president of the powerful Chicago Sanitary Board, last night.

Pneumonia contracted four days ago was the immediate cause, King, unable to take nourishment since last Thursday, sat in a chair until an hour before his death.

His four children, Bridgette, 15, Laura and Helen, 10-year-old twins, and Lawrence Jr., 5, were asleep in the house. Anxiety over their safety sapped the strength of the father after the bomb was exploded under the front porch of their home. Their mother died two years ago.

King was the Crowe-Thompson committee man of the 12 ward, in which he was born. He was the senior member of the drainage board and the third to die while in office in three years. Trustee Henry A. Berger was killed Friday when a stone fell from a building under construction in the loop and struck him.

King's concern over the safety of his children was aggravated by the bombing of a store owned by his secretary, Sellac Graham, following that of

The dead man is believed by police to have been a Pinkerton detective. He was a licensed private detective in Indianapolis.
