ZERO WEATHER GRIPS INDIANA

Indianapolis, Dec. 3.—(UP)—Below zero temperatures prevailed in Indiana this morning for the second time within a week, and forecasts of the U. S. Weather bureau indicated that readings far below normal would continue for the next day.

Terre Haute reported the lowest temperature last night, with 2 degrees below zero, Indianapolis registered 1 degree below, and readings were generally near zero. Evansville reported 6 above zero.

Temperature will rise slowly tonight, but may be as low as 10 above zero in Indianapolis, J. H. Armstrong, U. S. weather bureau meteorologist, predicted. Continued rising temperature was forecast for tomorrow.

The cold wave had the entire mid-west at its mercy, morning readings showed. Springfield, Ill., reported 2 below zero, and Louisville, Ky., had the same reading. Light snow struck Fort Wayne, but no fall of consequence occurred in the state during the past 24 hours, and none was predicted for the next 24 hours.

No deaths directly traceable to the cold had been reported in Indiana from the second wave. Two persons died in the first cold spell of the season, late last week.

Baseball Managers Gather For Meeting

Chattanooga, Tenn., Dec. 3.—(UP)—Major and minor league baseball officials, gathering here today, prepared for the 28th annual convention of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues which opens a three day session tomorrow.

Most of the major league clubs and all of the minor leagues in organized baseball were represented.

Among the more important questions which will come up are the draft, proposed legislation to curtail the overhead expenses of minor leagues, the election of an international league president, and the appeal of Infelizer George Torporcer and Manager Billy Southworth of the Rochester International League club.

Young Resigns As Pennsylvania Coach

Philadelphia, Dec. 3.—(UP)—Louis A. Young has resigned as head football coach at the University of Pennsylvania to accept a newly created position as assistant to the chairman of the council of athletics. No successor has been selected. Young coached the Pennsylvania football teams for seven years. His teams won 45 games, lost 15 and tied 2.

Iowa To Know Its Conference Fate Soon

Chicago, Dec. 3.—(UP)—Now under suspension for alleged proselyting of athletes, the University of Iowa probably will know Saturday just what its future position in the western conference will be. This week-end the faculty athletic

committee of the Big Ten will meet and since it was the faculty athletic committee which suspended Iowa last year in all probability there will be a verdict as to whether the Hawkeyes are to be put out of the Big Ten altogether or are to be allowed readmittance.

When the suspension order was put into effect Iowa was told to get its "house into order." That order meant that if there were any subsidized athletes at the Hawkeye institution the so-called subsidization was to be remedied.

Plaintiff charges defendant with failure to provide a home; cruel and inhuman treatment and asks that her maiden name of Esther Biggs be restored. The complaint was filed and a summons ordered issued to sheriff of Allen county returnable December 20. Petition for allowance set for hearing December 7. Notice ordered. D. B. Erwin is attorney for plaintiff. Ed A. Bosse entered appearance for defendant. Rule to answer.

Sheriff Earl Hollingsworth has been given warrants on indictments number 1 and 2 of the grand jury, returnable forthwith. The names are not made public until the arrests are made.

Grudge Ends With Murder And Arrest

Superior, Wis., Dec. 3.—(UP)—A grudge between a policeman and a police sergeant, settled with a revolver by the subordinate while both were on duty in uniform, accounted for a body in the county morgue and a prisoner in jail here today.

Police sergeant Arthur H. Zimmerman died early today in a hospital of a wound inflicted 22 hours earlier by Patrolman Benjamin C. Myers. Myers faces murder charges.
