Restraining Order Ties Up Finances Of City

Michigan City, Ind., Dec. 4.—(U.P.)—Mayor Fred G. Miller and members of his democratic city administration today were restrained from disbursing, paying out, or appropriating any funds of the city, in an order signed by Judge Harry L. Crumpacker of superior court.

Republicans, in a suit filed late yesterday, asked that the order be made permanent. Hearing on the petition will be held in Judge Crumpacker's court on Dec. 14.

Signing of the order virtually ties up Michigan City's finances. The suit was filed by republicans as an outgrowth of action by Miller's council a few weeks ago, in passing several ordinances dealing with city funds. One of them appropriated \$5,000 to be used in paying attorneys fighting Miller's case.
