Columbia City, Dec. 16.—(U.P.)—Joe Saraceno, alias Joe Taylor, pleaded not guilty late Saturday on a charge of bank robbery with a deadly weapon with intent to kill and was reminded to care of the sheriff with bond fixed at \$40,000, for trial at the February term of circuit court.

Saraceno is charged with having been implicated in robbery of the Columbia City State bank last April 18, in which \$5,000 was obtained, and a woman bystander killed.

commission as he chooses.

An effort also will be made in the house to ring up the \$135,000, 000 public buildings bill as an emergency measure designed to relieve unemployment within the next 24 hours. A similar emergency exists for the bill to allow the radio commission to function beyond the date set for its expiration, Dec. 31. The radio bill is scheduled for passage early in the day, and is almost certain to become a law before congress starts its Christmas vacation, Saturday.

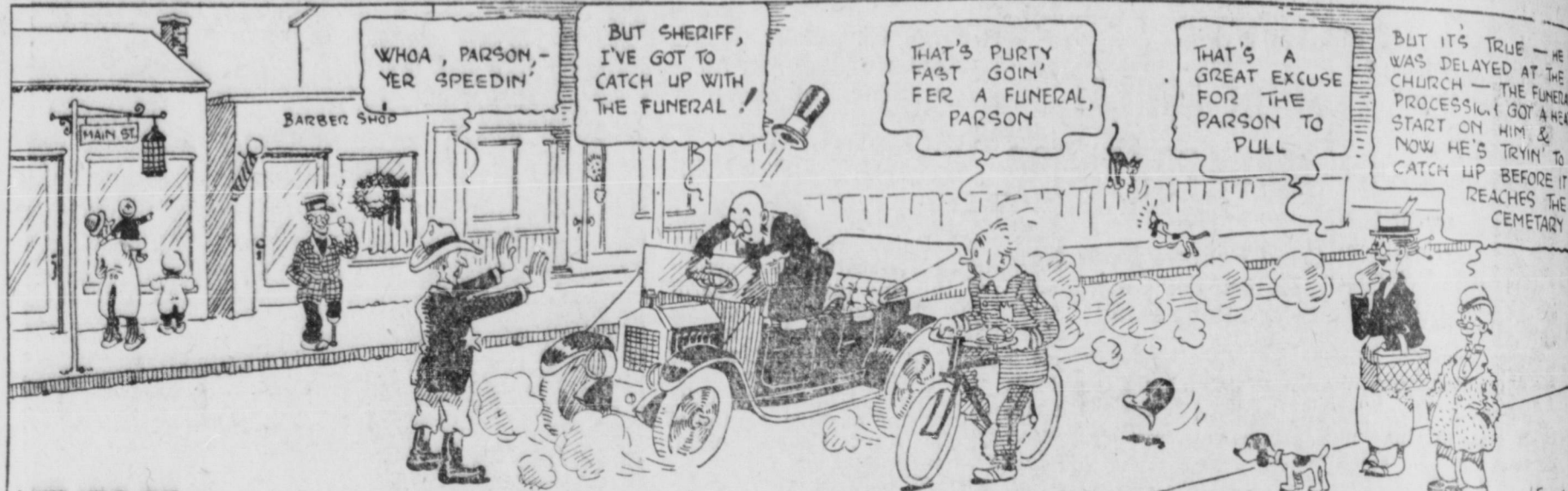

Man Known Here Hurt In Accident

Huntington, Ind., Dec. 16.—(U.P.)—Police and the sheriff found no evidence today to substantiate a story told by Robert Butler, Indianapolis newspaperman, that assassins had followed him from northwestern Indiana and fired at him with shotguns.

Butler figured in an auto wreck Saturday evening. He said his car was forced from the road by a large machine which he believed was driven by northern Indiana racketeers, after him because of his part in obtaining information from them in recent vice probes.

The Butler car was badly wrecked. It had struck a tree, the windshield was shattered, and one fender and the radiator were off. Butler said he saw the flash of a gun as the big machine passed him, and that his windshield was broken by slugs from the gun. Officers found no trace of bullet marks on the car, but it was explained that there might have been no such marks, had the full charge spent itself on the windshield.

Butler suffered severe but not critical injuries.

Editor's Note: Butler is a son of the late Thaddeus Butler, former publisher of the Decatur Herald. He is well-known in Decatur and for several years has been identified as a political worker and investigator.

Weather Is Good

Seville, Spain, Dec. 16.—(U.P.)—With good flying weather reported as far west as the Cape Verde Islands, Lieut. Col. Tadeo Larre Borges of the Uruguayan army, and Capt. Leon Challe, his French companion, were believed early to-

day to have covered more than half the distance to the mainland of Brazil, in their attempted non-stop flight across the South Atlantic.

Flying a French Brecuet plane powered with a 400-horse power

Lorraine motor, the aviators made a perfect getaway at 12:55 p. m. (7:55 a. m. est.) yesterday. They planned, upon reaching the South American coast, to follow the shoreline as long as their gasoline lasted, then, after refueling, to con-

tinue to Montevideo. A large group of notables, including the Uruguayan president, Segismundo Lorez Rios and engineer Cananini of the Uruguayan ministry of public works, were present to witness the takeoff.
