**Threaten Judge When  
Pleas Are Unheeded**

Vernon, Ind., Dec. 17.—(U.P.)—Two junior members of Chicago's gangland bemoaned in vociferous tones, the fact that they had no machine guns with which to make carnage in the courtroom at Vernon.

Howard Mackay and John Ross, former fellow prisoners of Gene Alger, shouted curses and threats at Judge John R. Carney, when he sentenced them to 5-year terms at the state reformatory. They had been convicted on charges of attempting a jail delivery for Alger, who is awaiting trial on a charge of bank robbery.

Sheriff Wilbur Bannister and Carl Losey, state policeman, shared the threats with Judge John R. Carney. "If we had a machine gun we'd mow the whole lot of you down," the boys shouted. "Maybe you sent us up for five years, but we'll never stay there that long. We'll make a break the first chance we get, and we'll 'get' you plenty."

The death threats were made when Judge Carney refused their plea to change the place of confinement, to the state prison at Michigan City. They said they would rather spend 20 years at Michigan City than five at the reformatory at Pendleton.

**Smallpox Spreading

**Peru Bank Loot  
Partly Recovered**

Peru, Ind., Dec. 17.—(U.P.)—Officials of the First National bank of Peru report they had recovered \$3,000 in bonds stolen in a holdup of the bank Oct. 18. The bonds were first located by the Harris Trust Company, Chicago, who in turn had secured them from an eastern concern. No trace has been found of the persons who first sold the bonds.

Bank officials also said that \$20,000 in stolen securities, part of them from the local bank, were offered for sale by a St. Paul, Minn., brokerage firm. Officials of the firm are being questioned by detectives.

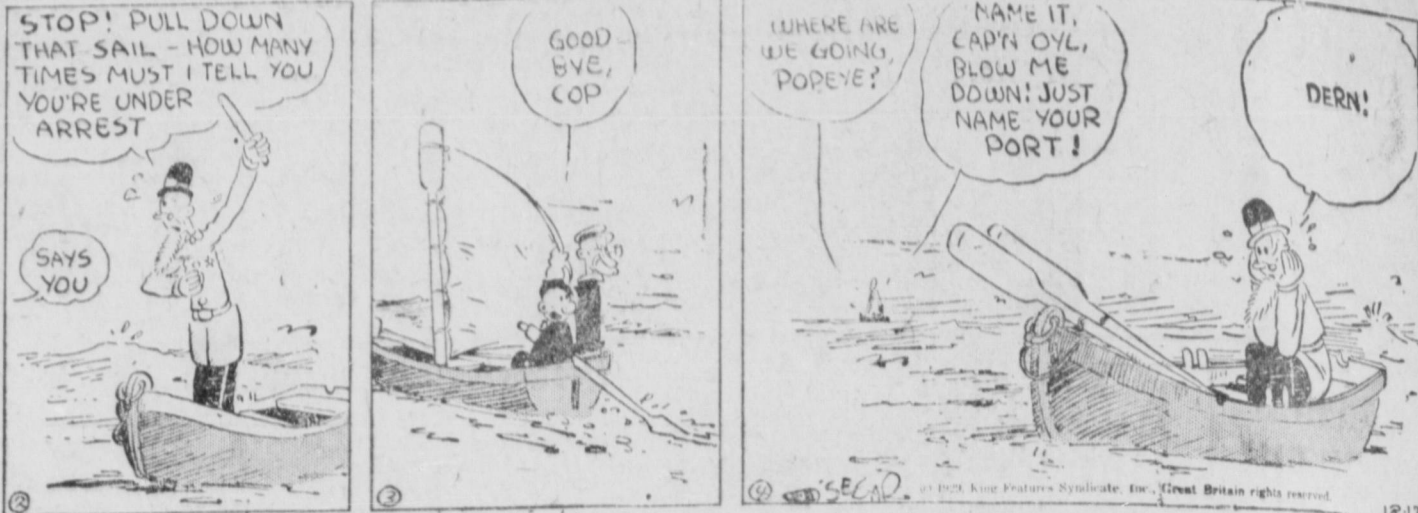

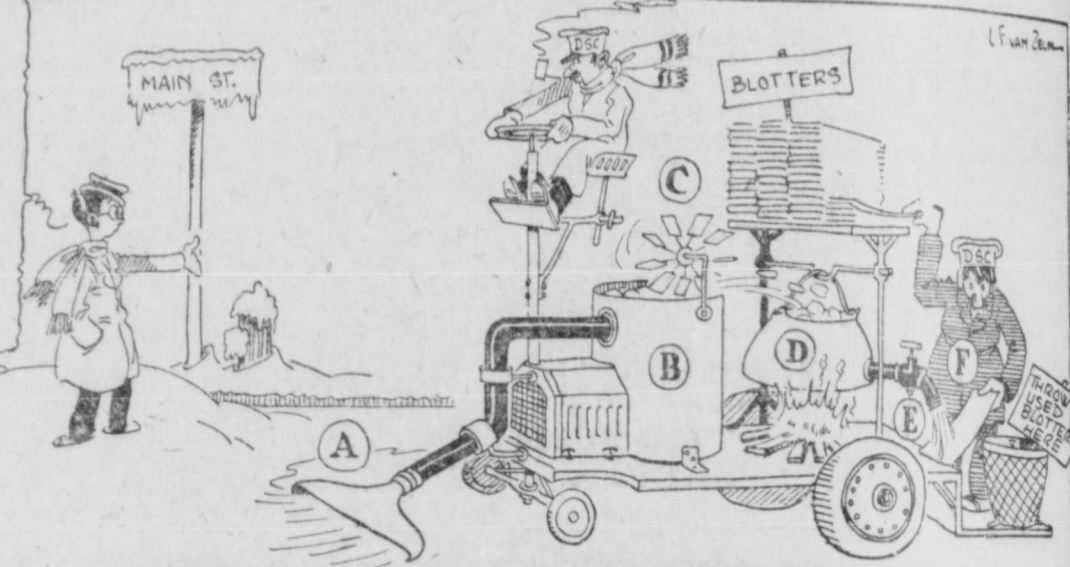

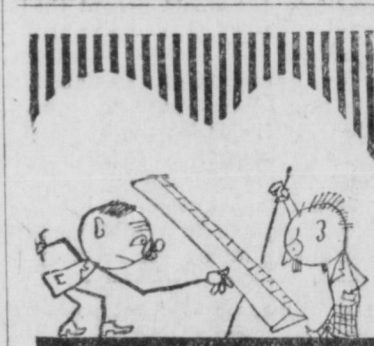

**Commission Meets**

Indianapolis, Dec. 17.—(U.P.)—Indiana's crime commission carried its study of law violation into a new field last night when it held a joint meeting with the Society for Mental Hygiene to hear an address

by Dr. George M. Kline, commissioner of the Massachusetts department of mental diseases.

Kline told of the system used in Massachusetts that required mental examinations for all persons accused of serious crime. He said

an impartial commission appointed by a court examined the persons to be tried, reported to the court and the finding was accepted by both parties.

Out of 548 persons examined for traces of insanity, only 40 had

been found insane, he said. The commission will meet again January 25.
