Is Restrained From Filing Further Suits

Bridgeport, Conn., Dec. 28.—(UP)—Mrs. Katherine King Fogarty today was "forever enjoined and restrained" from bringing suit against James J. (Gene) Tunney based on an alleged promise by Tunney to marry her.
Judge Carl Foster, who yesterday ordered judgment for Tunney in the former heavyweight boxing champion's counter-suit to Mrs. Fogarty's \$600,000 breach of promise suit, ordered the clerk of Fairfield county Superior court to sign the injunction requested by Tunney's lawyers.
The injunction read:
"Mrs. Katherine King Fogarty her agents, Attorneys and servants, are forever enjoined and restrained from making any claim against the defendant, James J. Tunney, or suing him on any matter or cause claimed to have existed or occurred prior to July 24, 1928."
Patrolman Is Killed
—New Castle, Pa., Dec. 28.—(UP)—Fresh details of state policemen joined today the search for the two bandits who shot and killed a motor patrolman and wounded another yesterday while a blonde woman companion hid her face from view.
The trio of bandits shot down Corporal Brady Paul and wounded Private Ernest Moore of the state highway patrol force when the two officers attempted to stop them after they had held up a store in Butler, Pa.
Moore, released from the hospital here after being treated for three bullet wounds, said the two men got out of the automobile and fired several shots at him. He said he did not see whether the woman was shooting as she remained inside. The trio had a small child, about 4 years old, with them according to Moore.

er of all is Mlle. Victor, who has more than once startled Deauville and Monte Carlo by smacking down a million francs on one play, winning or losing without a gesture.
The Anglo-French combination has now been partially identified. It is the same group of sportsmen who, in August, startled the casino at Biarritz by one of the most daring series of plays hitherto staged, taking 27,000,000 francs from the bank in the killing.
Some of the tension shown by Frank Gould, in whose \$5,000,000 casino the wild play is progressing has been relieved by the assumption of the bank—permitted in Baccarat but not in roulette—by the syndicates who are now opposing each other.

Denies Connection

Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 28.—(UP)—Dr. Hiram W. Evans, Imperial Wizard of the Ku Klux Klan, denied today that the Klan was campaigning in Alabama for United States Senator J. Thomas Heflin, who seeks reelection, and for other candidates for political offices.
"The Klan as an organization aligned itself against Governor Smith last year because it believed his defeat necessary for the preservation of Americanism," Evans said. "But the Klan as an organization takes no part in local campaigns such as that in Alabama."

ENFORCEMENT TO BE SHIFTED

Justice Department May Get Chance to Enforce Dry Law

Washington, Dec. 28.—(UP)—The transfer of prohibition authority from the treasury to the justice department virtually has been agreed on by the administration and congressional dry officials involved in the recent volcanic eruption of the prohibition controversy.

In addition to other tightening steps planned, the house leaders are arranging to adopt immediately after the holidays, a resolution which already has passed the senate, calling for a joint congressional committee to investigate the transfer plan.

The investigation will be undertaken with the idea that a bill to authorize the transfer is to be drawn and probably passed by congress before it adjourns next summer. Only the industrial alcohol unit is to be left in the treasury.
