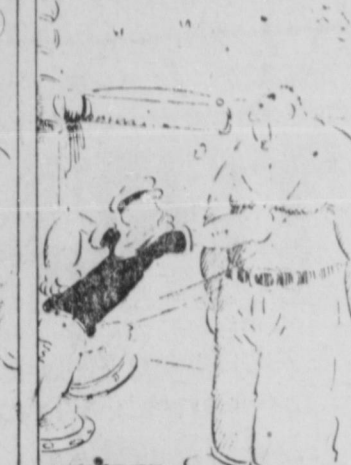

BOTH HOUSES DISCUSS NEW LEGISLATION

man Snell of the rules committee, which determines the precedence of legislation, has promised to bring it up to the last of next week.

Rep. Cochran, Dem., Mo., a wet, will submit a minority report, singling out particularly the amendment adopted by the committee, 10 to 4, which gives the attorney general virtual veto power over alcoholic permits, though leaving the alcohol permit section under the treasury.

The senate's attention is centered upon charges against enforcement personnel and new charges by Senator Brookhart, Repn., Iowa, about drinking among rich New York clubmen.

Senator Borah, Repn., Idaho, dry spokesman, has written prohibition Commissioner Doran, demanding removal or exoneration of John F. C. Herbert, prohibition administrator for Idaho and Montana.

Brookhart retailed a story, brought to him in a letter, of "real gin cocktails" being served at monthly dinners of the Century club in New York city.

Brookhart said he desired the letter's contents be called to the attention of President Hoover and George W. Wickersham, chairman of the president's law enforcement commission.

His wet colleagues failed to see why Brookhart considered this so important, telling him he could find any number of such places in large cities.

Slavery Not Stamped Out

It has been stated that there are over 4,000,000 persons being held in slavery. The countries in which the traffic still exists are Abyssinia, the Sudan, Sierra Leone, Liberia, China, Burma and Nepal.

Indianapolis, Jan. 31 — (UP) — Ralph Scott, 40; Greenfield, rice broker, was shot and seriously wounded when he resisted a holding by four bandits in front of his home at Greenfield this morning.

Curbing Mob Spirit

The expression "read the riot act" means to warn or reprimand. As early as 1715 England had a statute for preventing tumultuous and riotous assemblage. The act provided that in case of 12 persons or more unlawfully assembling and disturbing the peace, an officer could make proclamation of the general provisions of the riot act and call upon them to disperse. If they failed to obey, they were guilty of felony.

It was found necessary to amputate Scott's right hand, blown to shreds by the charge from a sawed off shot gun. He was in an Indianapolis hospital.

Amputation of one foot, also riddled by shotgun bullets, may be necessary.

George Pennington, Indianapolis, taxi driver, is held by Greenfield authorities for questioning in the shooting.
