## BALLOONIST OF WAR FAME HIDES FOR 11 YEARS

### Many Parachute Jumps Won Coveted Decoration for James A. McDevitt

Cincinnati, O., March 3.—(UP)—  
The last time James A. McDevitt,  
tumbled over the bridge of a balloon  
basket and floated safely to earth  
under the comforting folds of a  
parachute, he resolved upon a life  
of security and quiet.

That was back in 1918 when  
dropping through thin ozone  
occurred with more marked regularity  
than lunch hours.

For more than 11 years McDevitt,  
a lieutenant, kept his resolution. He  
lived in such obscurity that not even  
his most intimate neighbors guessed  
that his mild, unobtrusive man was  
possessor of the coveted Disting-  
uished Service Cross.

As a member of the 11th Balloon  
Company, he served the major part  
of America's service in the war in  
France. He does not recall the num-  
ber of times he was shot down.

Probably they were frequent since  
on one 24-hour shift, he did the  
spiral act three times.

The first time he leaped from a  
burning craft occurred shortly after  
he landed in France, having had one  
leap to his credit while in training  
camps. Doing observation duty, an  
enemy plane applied the torch and  
as the former balloonist explained  
"I jumped. There was nothing else to  
do, previous experience to the  
contrary notwithstanding."

On another occasion, his para-  
chute was riddled with gun fire as  
he descended. An Allied plane har-  
assed his craft upon another occa-  
sion but McDevitt has his doubts
