### GENEVA WINS 3-SCHOOL MEET

Geneva high school Cardinals won the triangular track and field meet held at Geneva Friday afternoon between Kirkland, Hartford and Geneva high schools. Geneva scored a total of 46 1/2 points; Kirkland 24 points and Hartford trailed with a total of 9 1/2 points.

McKean, of Kirkland was the individual star of the meet scoring 19 1/2 points out of Kirklands total of 24 points. The day was ideal for a field meet and a large crowd attended the events.

### CAMBRIDGE IS RACE WINNER

London, April 12—(U.P.)—An American coxswain, R. E. Swartwout, drove a Cambridge crew to victory over Oxford today in the annual varsity boat race.

When the two shells pulled up at Mortlake, after a gruelling battle all the way from Putney Bridge, in which Oxford maintained a short lead over a great part of the distance, the light blue was leading by 2 1/2 lengths.

Official time for the race was announced as 19 minutes and 9 seconds, 15 seconds faster than that of 1929, and 28 seconds behind the record of 1924.

Rain and a fairly brisk wind that produced choppy water materially reduced the time.

Both crews got away to splendid starts, with Cambridge using a slightly lower stroke during the first half mile, Oxford was rowing at 37, with Cambridge at 36.

The dark blues maintained a lead, varying from a quarter of a length to half a length, all the way to the two-mile mark, just beyond Hammersmith bridge, where the Cambridge crew began to show its resistance, gradually cutting down the distance.

Both crews lowered their strokes at this point to 25, and at the Doves, almost at the two-mile post, Cambridge pulled even.

Cambridge was rowing more steadily at this point, and Oxford was showing signs of tiring.

The little American coxswain, Swartwout, gave his crew a rest along the wall, where Oxford once more put to the front by three quarters of a length. Cambridge cut down the lead at Chiswick, with three quarters of the race over.

At Barnesbridge Cambridge had pulled into the lead and crept ahead of the dark blue shell by three quarters of a length. Swart-

wout lifted the stroke to 33.

At Whitehart, Cambridge was a length ahead, and at Mortlake brewery had increased the advantage to one and a half lengths, dropping her stroke to 24, while Oxford was manfully struggling with a count of 32.

Cambridge flashed across the finish by what looked to spectators to be about four lengths. The official estimate, however, was two lengths.

Today's race broke the tie that has existed between the two universities, and sent Cambridge into the lead for the first time in 66 years.

The Cambridge crew appeared to be in better physical condition, and was at the finish, without a single man showing signs of distress. Five of the Oxford crew, on the other hand, were exhausted by the heart-breaking pull, as they leaned on their oars after crossing the finish line.

### ATHLETICS AND CUBS CHOSEN

New York, April 12—(U.P.)—The Philadelphia Athletics and Chicago Cubs are again picked to win the major league pennant races in the annual United Press poll.

The Athletics are overwhelming favorites to win the American league pennant, while the Cubs are selected to capture the National league flag after a close race.

Sixteen major league baseball writers, one from each team, contributed their predictions. The Athletics were selected by every American league contributor, while seven out of eight National league writers picked the Cubs. The Pirates were picked to nose out the Cubs by the Pittsburgh writer.

The votes for second place in the American league were distributed as follows: Yankees 5 votes; Cleveland 2; Detroit 1. The votes for second place in the National were: Pittsburgh 5 votes; New York 1; St. Louis 1; Chicago 1.

The Athletics are unbeatable was the consensus of the American league dopesters. Oddly enough, the Philadelphia writer had more fears for the Athletics than any other contributor.

"The race will be much closer than last year when the Athletics won by 18 games," he said. "The Yankees will be dangerous if they get the pitching. The St. Louis Browns have a great manager in Bill Killefer and will always be near the top. The Chicago White Sox will be the surprise club of the league. The Athletics however are better fortified with reserves and have more confidence in themselves than last year."
