Plan Trackless Trams
Tokyo (U.P.)—To meet increased competition from private motor-bus lines which are cutting deep into the revenue of Tokyo's municipal street railways the city electric bureau is reported planning to install a system of trackless trams operated from overhead electric wires. Shanghai is the only city in the Far East with trackless trams.

SCIENCE GROUP HOLDS SESSION IN PHILADELPHIA

Economic Tendencies and Effect on World Peace Considered

Philadelphia, May 2.—(U.P.)—The 34th annual meeting of the American Academy of Political and Social Science is in progress at the Bellevue-Stratford Hotel here. The president of the academy, Dr. Ernst Minor Patterson, is presiding. The general topic of the meeting is "Economic Tendencies Affecting the Peace of the World."

The opening session began Friday morning, when Mayor Harry A. Mackey welcomed the members of the academy and delegates on behalf of the City of Philadelphia, while Dr. Patterson extended a welcome on behalf of the academy. Other speakers were: Dr. Robert R. Kuczynski, the distinguished German authority on statistics, who gives each year a part of his time to investigation for the Institute of Economics at the Brookings Institution at Washington; Prof. Henry P. Fairchild of New University; Mrs. Edna McMahon of Hunter College, New City; Professor Joseph P. Olin of Columbia University; Horace B. Drury of the States Shipping Board; William Paley of the Columbia Broadcasting System; Dean Emory R. Johnson of the Wharton School of Finance, Commerce at the University of Pennsylvania; Governor George Norris of the Federal Reserve of Philadelphia; Louis T. Den, member of Congress, Pennsylvania; and Virgil J. Clary, the "Business Week" New City.
