Something New In Ensembles Arrives

Weather Review For Week Is Announced

Indianapolis, May 3.—(U.P.)—The disturbance over the Great Lakes Friday morning is now moving into the north Atlantic, while the western disturbance has advanced only slightly and extends from Alberta over the Rocky Mountain states to western Texas.

Showers have occurred from the upper lakes to the New England coast, and extensively from the Rockies westward, while some showers are reported from the middle Mississippi valley and from Texas.

Temperatures are lower from the Ohio Valley northward and in the north Pacific district; but it is generally warmer from the upper Mississippi valley to the eastern slopes of the Rockies, and the readings over the Northern plains are new considerably above normal.

Two Shootings Occur In Chicago Friday

Chicago, May 3.—(U.P.)—Alice Rita Vioght, 29, Chicago telephone supervisor, was probably fatally wounded early today when she and her policeman sweetheart were assaulted held up by a negro bandit as they sat in a car parked near her home.

Her sweetheart, Herman Last, of the Hyde Park police squad, was held for questioning.

He told fellow officers that when the bandit poked his head into the

car he became excited and drew his revolver, discharging it accidentally. He said the bullet struck Miss Vioght.

Last also declared that he shot at the negro three or four times as the latter fled but police said Last's revolver had not been discharged.

Possibly shot by another holdup victim, an unidentified man, suffering from an abdominal bullet wound physicians said would prove fatal, was picked up early today on the steps of the St. Francis hospital.

The man refused to reveal his name or tell how he had been wounded. Police found a revolver on a blood stained sidewalk several blocks away from the hospital.

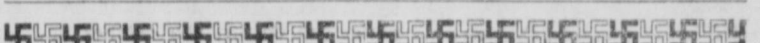

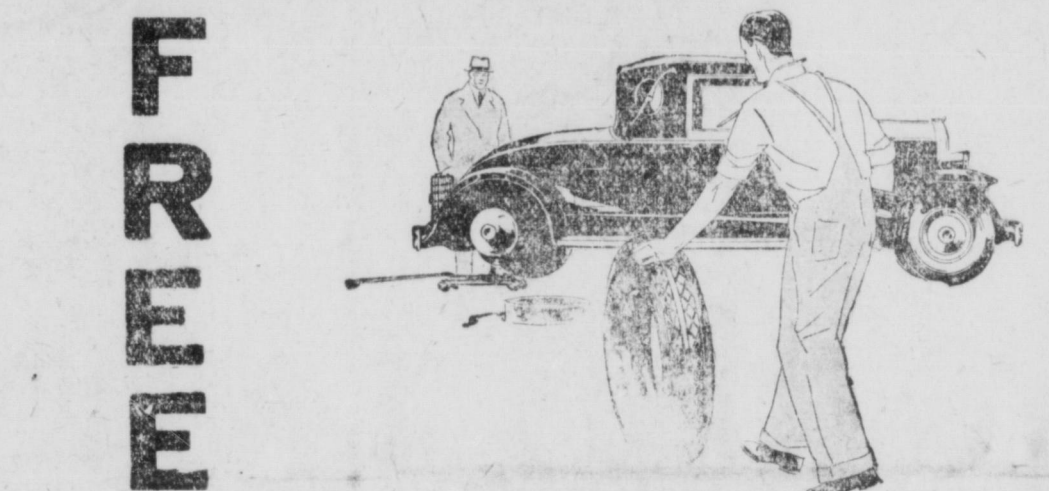

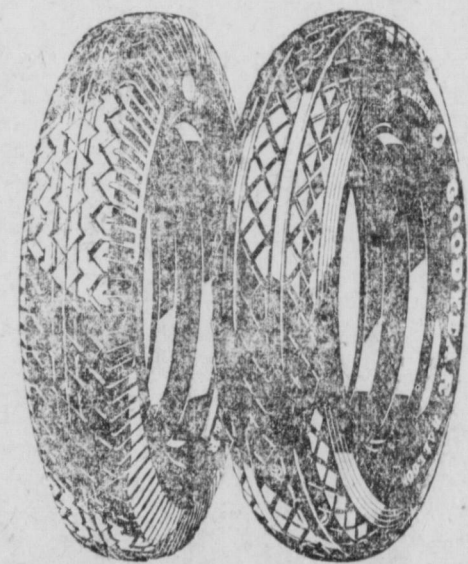
