Ruth Bryan Owen Is Renominated In Florida

Tallahassee, Fla., June 4.—(U.P.)—Congressman Ruth Bryan Owen was well ahead of her wet opponent today as returns from yesterday's democratic primary election came in slowly.

Early today she had a 6,003 lead over Dewitt Dean, her fourth district opponent. The vote was Owen, 8,952; Dean, 2,076.

In the third congressional district, former Governor Sidney J. Catts, prominent for his anti-Smith stand in the 1928 presidential election, was trailing Congressman Thomas A. Yon. Incomplete returns gave Yon 9,287; Catts 6,938 and Mayor Harvey Bayliss of Pensacola, 1,232.

Garroting is Used by Gangs

Strangulation Method Supplants Guns In Chicago Murder

Chicago, June 4.—(U.P.)—Gangland has adopted garroting, the Parisian Apache's favorite method of committing murder, as a means of putting its enemies out of the way, it appeared today as detectives investigated the murder of Thomas Somnerio, Capone racketeer, whose body was found last night in a west side alley.

There were no signs of gun play, making the first time in the long history of Chicago gang murders, police said, that the traditional automatic pistols, sawed-off shotguns and machine guns have been discarded for a strangling wire.

One theory of the garroting was that ballistic experts have been too successful reading clues down from rifling marks on bullets for gangsters to take chances.

Somnerio was the eighth victim of the latest outburst of gang war since last Saturday, when a gangster was assassinated on the street. Sunday three more were slain at Fort Lake, Ill., and the remainder in one and two in Chicago.

Detectives also investigated the possibility that the murder of Samuel Massillino in Argo, Ill., also was connected with the gang warfare. Massillino was shot to death in his room. Police were investigating the theory that he was an alcohol racketeer.

Somnerio apparently had been tortured and taken for a "ride" by his gangland enemies. His hands had been tied and he had been hit

on the head. Around his neck were deep furrows indicating he had been garrotted with a wire noose.

In the death of Somnerio, once accused of complicity in the murder of Octavius Granady, negro candidate for alderman in the "bloody twentieth" ward, police saw a first move of reprisal for the machine gun slaying of three gangsters at Fox Lake Sunday.

Because of Somnerio's close connection with the powerful Capone interests, quick retaliations are expected and "the worst" is liable to happen from now on, police said, unless gang leaders can be hunted up immediately.

In a widespread drive to end the gang war, police had 215 suspects in jail last night. Among them were a number of notorious gangsters, including Myles O'Donnell, brother of the better known "Klondyke" O'Donnell; Harry Guzik, one of Capone's beer syndicate partners; Hymie Levins, a Capone speakeasy collector, and Vincent Accardo, extortionist.
