NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS
Notice is hereby given that Monday, November 3, 1930, will be the last day to pay your full installment of taxes. The county treasurer's office will be open from 8 A. M. to 4 P. M. during the tax paying season. All taxes not paid by that time will become delinquent and a 10% penalty will be added. Those who have bought or sold property and wish a division of taxes are asked to come in at once.
Call on the Auditor for errors and any reductions. The Treasurer can make no corrections.
The treasurer will not be responsible for the penalty of delinquent taxes resulting from the omission of taxpayer to state definition of what property, they desire to pay, in whose name it may be found, in what township or corporation it is situated.
Persons owing delinquent taxes should pay them at once. The law is such that there is no option left for the taxpayer but enforce the collection of delinquent taxes.
The annual sale of delinquent lands and lots will take place on the second Monday in February 1931 at 10 o'clock.
County orders will not be paid to anyone owing delinquent taxes. All persons are warned against them. No receipts will be paid after expiration of time, as the new depository law requires the Treasurer to make daily deposits.
Particular attention: If you pay taxes in more than one township mention the fact to the Treasurer. Also give to your receipts call for all your real estate and personal property.
In making inquiries of the Treasurer regarding taxes to insure they do not run to include return postage, call on Ed A. Aschauer, Treasurer Adams County, Indiana.

"Soviet Russia" is a living record and history of Russia. The author, William Henry Chamberlain for nearly a decade was Russian correspondent for The Christian Science Monitor and has written what is perhaps the most substantial and just estimate of the Soviet state that has yet been made by an American.

"The New World of Physical Discovery" by Lloyd L. Darrow gives for the first time a clear and comprehensive discussion of the fascinating realm of physical discovery. To read it is to secure a liberal education in a subject which to many has been a sealed volume. The reader will learn how physical science began; its growth, what it is today, and why it is what it is.

"Safari" by Martin Johnson is a Saga of the African Blue. It is the supreme story of the African wilderness. The author makes the reader a spectator at the thousand-ringed circus of the African wilds. Aside from the amazing episodes which carry on the story this volume will occupy a place in literature because it captures for future generations the vanishing wild life and animal personalities of Africa. The book contains 66 illustrations, taken by the author. They are considered remarkable photographs.

TALE IN FRANCE

Biographer Claims "Eagle of the Andes" Was Inspired by Naturalist

Paris, Oct. 7—(UP)—Simon Bolivar, popularly known as the "Eagle of the Andes" and the "George Washington of South America," was inspired in France and not in the United States to deliver his native land from Spanish domination, according to Georges Lafont, French biographer of the famous liberator.

M. Lafont declares that the most momentous single event in the hero's life was a conversation he had one September evening of 1804 with the famed naturalist, Maron Alexander von Humboldt, recently returned from South America with vast knowledge and materials of his extensive travels. The vivid picture the great scholar drew of South America's economic dependence upon Spain fired the young man with the initial zeal to drive out the Spaniard that was never quenched until success crowned his efforts.

The conversation, which took place at von Humboldt's home in the Rue des Petits Augustins, marked the birth of the eagle, despite the popular belief that Bolivar came determined to free his country men from a foreign yoke following his travels and studies in North America.

The approaching centenary of Bolivar's death—December 17—besides being the occasion for preparation of appropriate commemorative exercises in his honor among the South American legations and societies here has served to recall the life of the young Venezuelan patriot in the French capital during the Napoleonic regime.

Although no definite commemorative program has been announced for December 17, it is expected that the Parisian legations of Venezuela, Colombia, Ecuador, Peru and Bolivia will observe the day.

Battles at Barbacena and Palmyra, towns which lie in the mountain passes along the route, are expected at any moment at the opposing armies converge.

The third battle front is thousands of miles to the northwest, in the famous rubber-producing jungle territory of Para.

A smaller engagement is threatening on the western border of Rio Grande do Sul, where federal forces first fled when the revolution broke out.

It was difficult, in the face of conflicting claims, to obtain an accurate estimate of the comparative strength of the federal and rebel armies.

The federal government can put 100,000 trained men into the field, it was said here by persons in close touch with Brazil's military affairs. The revolutionists claim to have 40,000 armed troops in the south alone, with many more coming up steadily from the reserves. It is not believed, however, that they have anywhere near twice that number, as reported from some rebel sources.
