WILL EXPLAIN

PARK SYSTEM

Indianapolis, Oct. 10.—How Indiana in little more than a decade acquired and is operating a system of state parks that won national commendation, will be explained by Richard Lieber, Indiana conservation department director, at the Ohio Valley and Great Lakes regional conference on state parks, to be held at Columbus, Ohio, Oct. 5-10.

State park acquisition, development and operation is only one of the coordinated public services rendered by the conservation department with its six major divisions of economic geology, entomology, forestry, lands and waters, fish and game, engineering, and thirty subdivisions.

Indiana, pioneered with a small state fee to its parks, necessary to help operate the reservations. By business-like operations the department made state parks pay a handsome return on the investments, with each year park earnings permitting added development.

At the beginning, the state possessed but one park, and all land area inherited at creation of the department in 1919, totaled less than 3,000 acres. Today this department controls more than 26,000 acres with 12,000 acres in a single game preserve, purchased from fish and game division earnings, and more than 5,000 acres in public parks, now ten in number.

Modern hotels have been erected in four parks, and development started in the great Dunes Park on the south shore of Lake Michigan that most likely will result in a hotel being erected in the spring of 1931. More than 150,000 paid admissions were recorded for state parks this year, department records show.

While state parks, most public demand for outdoor recreation and entertainment at modest cost, the conservation department is making just as noteworthy strides in reclaiming idle acres through reforestation, and propagating and protecting fish and game, it is pointed out.

From 5,000 to 8,000 acres of forest lands are acquired annually for the public estate, millions of fish raised to restock public waters, and game preserves provided where wild life lives in sanctuary and naturally reproduces unmolested by hunters.

Advancement of state highways played an important contributing part in the rapid strides of conservation in Indiana, for all of the public estate is reached over modern roads, state maintained. Observers of the work point out that of the many, many thousands of park visitors, a large per cent come from out-state, and their travels add materially to Indiana's economic gain. All interested in conservation, forestry, state parks, and kindred greater are invited to the Ohio conference.

Thousands of kids will be glad to learn that on their next visit to Pokagon State park they will see in addition to the wild animal herds which the state conservation department maintains at this great

lake park.

During this fall free live born, likewise one elk, is a happy family of Canada recorded an addition of three deer, elk and beaver at the park will go into the line shape, after pointing out attraction to summer visitors. More than 100 acres of park stitute range for these animals the corral fencing so placed visitors may see the wild animals in their native state.
