TWO NEW AIR LINES TO BOOST FLYING MILES

Greatest Development Since Private Concerns Entered Field

Chicago, Oct. 21.—(UP)—Within the next 30 days air mail and passenger planes operating within the United States will be flying more than 115,000 miles every 24 hours, according to Wisor Williams, manager of the American Air Transport Association.

Under the present schedule, the aggregate mileage now is 108,948 miles daily. The opening of two new transcontinental routes—one from Atlanta to Los Angeles and the other from New York to Los Angeles—will raise it to 115,000 miles.

Foreign air mail and passenger planes, which travel into Canada, Mexico, South America and into the Caribbean, account for an additional daily mileage of 17,254. This makes a combined daily total of 126,202 miles over an aerial network of 55,532 miles. Of this network, 31,562 miles are within the territorial limits of the United States.

Practically all of this flying has originated since Sept. 1, 1927, when the post office department turned over the last of the government-operated routes to private contractors.

When the two new air lines are put into operation, more than a score of new cities will have air service. Many more will be able to avail themselves of it by means of synchronization of train schedule with off-line mail stations and the establishment of feeder systems.

Since the beginning of air mail service by private contractors the miles of lighted airways, permitting the flying of cargoes at night, have increased from a few experimental routes in the middle west to 14,500 miles, while 608 airports and landing fields equipped with beacons and flood lights, help provide for the night service.

International commerce is rapidly coming to the realization of the value of the foreign air mail service, according to Williams. A letter may be sent to Santiago, Chile, 7,000 miles away, and an answer received within two weeks. The combined rail and steamship time to the same point is four weeks.

FRONTS ACT AS SAFEGUARDS

Montreal — (UP)—To add to the visibility of the self-propelled cars used on short lines of the Canadian Railway, railroad officials are having the fronts painted in a bright combination of red and yellow. The move is being made as a further safeguard against railroad crossing accidents.

OCEAN LEVELS

The mean level of the Pacific at the isthmus of Panama has been found to be about eight inches higher than the mean level of the Atlantic. In the month of February the levels are the same, but throughout the rest of the year, on account of current, tidal and wind influences, the mean level of the Pacific ranges above that of the Atlantic. It is as much as one foot higher in October.

MOSES' HORNS

ADMITTS BANK ROBBERY

Logansport, Ind., Oct. 21.—(UP)—A confession has been made by Joel Stamper, 22, according to Sheriff William Zerbe, that he robbed the Twelve Mile Bank of \$1,600 last August 14, but he denied robbing the Liberty Center Bank last April.

Stamper's wife had previously confessed the Twelve Mile hold-up, in which she remained in an auto outside the bank, Zerbe said. Stamper was brought here from Muncie, where he was re-captured after escaping from jail several days ago.

Stamper will be tried on the bank robbery charge, and his 19-year-old wife on a conspiracy charge carrying a two to 14-year sentence, authorities said.
