NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS
Notice is hereby given that Monday, November 3, 1930, will be the last day to pay your fall installment of taxes. The county treasurer's office will be open from 8 A. M. to 4 P. M. during the tax paying season. All taxes not paid by that time will become delinquent and a 10% penalty will be added. Those who have bought or sold property and wish a division of taxes are asked to come in at once.

Call on the Auditor for errors and any reductions. The Treasurer can make corrections.
The Treasurer will not be responsible for the penalty of delinquent taxes resulting from the omission of taxpayer to state definitely on what property, they desire to pay, in whose name it may be found, in what township or corporation it is situated.

Persons owing delinquent taxes should pay them at once, the law is such that there is no option left for the taxpayer but enforce the collection of delinquent taxes.

The annual sale of delinquent lands and lots will take place on the second Monday in February 1931 at 10:00 A. M.

County orders will not be paid to anyone owing delinquent taxes. All persons are warned against them. No receipts will be held after expiration of time, as the new depositary law requires the Treasurer to make daily deposits.

Particular attention: If you pay taxes in more than one township mention the fact to the Treasurer also see that your receipts call for all your real estate and personal property.

Anderson, Ind., Oct. 22.—(U.P.)—The two negro suspects who escaped the mob that lynched two of their companions in Marion last August 7, were brought to jail here last night, to await trial in circuit court in January.

James Cameron, 16, and Robert Sullivan, were granted change of venue from Grant county. Cameron is charged with the murder of Claude Deeter, and assault upon his girl companion, Thomas Shipley and Abram Smith, negroes, were hanged in the courthouse yard at Marion after allegedly confessing that they robbed and murdered Deeter, and attacked his companion.

Police Force Is Cut

Anderson, Ind., Oct. 22.—(U.P.)—Reductions in city employees, including policemen and firemen, will be effected on November 1 in order to reduce operating expenses to the revenue allowed by the state tax board, Mayor J. H. Mellett announced.

The city's general fund levy was reduced from 60 to 35 cents. Construction plans of the light and water departments will be postponed.

Mellett offered caustic criticism of the tax board's action in slashing the levy to a point 25 cents below the previous minimum, and putting it only about a third what is allowed Richmond, a city of some 7,000 more inhabitants.
