## JOE AIELLO IS GANG VICTIM

cigarette stubs, paper cups from  
a box of candy, a plate half filled  
with scrambled eggs, a cup half full  
of coffee. It was apparent the  
gangsters had been nervous. None  
of the cigarette stubs was short.  
A book of Kipling's "Soldiers  
Three" was upon the table, opened  
at the chapter headed "His Chance  
in Life."

Officers concluded that the apart-  
ment where Ruane was called was  
one of numerous hiding places  
which Aiello had used since in  
June, when the Lingle murder  
created such a furore that it be-  
came unsafe for any gangster to  
continue frequenting his old  
abodes.

The first conclusion of the of-  
ficers was that Capone had killed  
his rival, the man who once was  
his friend, but who left him to  
assume control of the north side  
gangs with George "Bugs" Moran

as his "muscle" lieutenant and the  
notorious Jack Zuta, now dead, as  
his bookkeeper. Aiello, once a  
baker, was rated on a par with  
Capone in underworld power and  
was considered Capone's chief riv-  
al.

Another theory was that the  
murder was engineered by a man  
known as "Joe the boss," a New  
York dictator of theUnione Sicil-  
ians, control of which it was believ-  
ed Aiello had attempted to gain.  
It was recalled that Tony Lom-  
bardo and Pasquale Lolordo both  
had dominated theUnione before  
they were slain by rival gangsters.  
It generally has been believed that  
both these men were murdered by  
Aiello or some of his men.

Mr. and Mrs. Edward Crawford,  
Pat Roche, chief investigator for who live in one of the apartments

the state's attorney, advanced a  
theory that Aiello was ordered  
killed by Capone in reprisal for  
the murder in June of Lingle, Ca-  
pone's friend. This, he pointed out,  
might also explain the murder a  
few months ago of Jack Zuta,  
Aiello's lieutenant. Roche has been  
an exponent of the theory that  
he "cut in" on their profits from  
north side underworld activities.

Ruane, who saved himself by  
hiding behind his cap after the  
first burst of fire, was one of sev-  
eral who escaped miraculously from  
the gun fire which mowed down  
Aiello.


Mr. and Mrs. Edward Crawford,
