in at once.

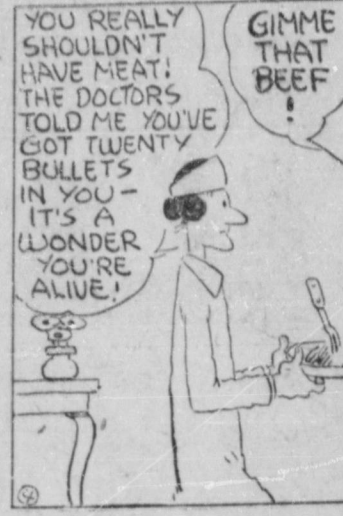
Call on the Auditor for errors and
any reductions. The Treasurer can
make no corrections.
The Treasurer will not be responsi-
ble for the penalty of delinquent
taxes resulting from the omission
of taxpayer to state definitely on
what property they desire to pay, in
what name it may be found, in
what township or corporation it is
situated.

Persons owing delinquent taxes
should pay them at once, the law is
such that there is no option left for
the Treasurer but enforce the col-
lection of delinquent taxes.
The annual sale of delinquent
lands and lots will take place on the
second Monday in February 1931 at
10:00 A. M.

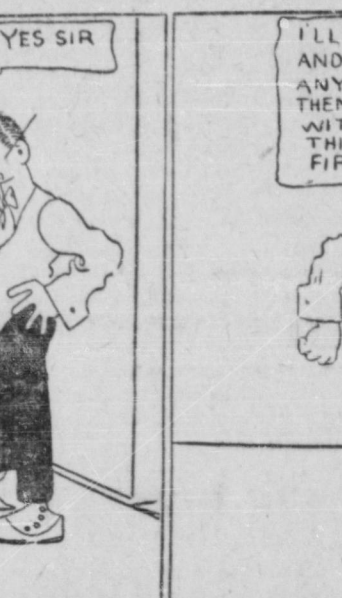
County orders will not be paid to

persons are warned against them.
No receipts will be held after ex-
piration of time, as the new deposi-
tory law requires the Treasurer to
make daily deposits.

with the army of occupation.

He returned to the United

He was a member of the Metho-

Post 43, and the Moose lodge.

mother, two sisters, Mrs. Mar-
guerite Harkless of Fort Wayne,

Orleans, La., and Clyde of Deca-
tur. A sister, Florence, preceded
him in death.

many relatives and a host of
friends.

Microphones and Trans-
lators Developed Plan
at Road Congress

Washington, Oct. 25.—(U.P.)—
A babble of many languages at
national conferences with im-
portant delay and confusion has
virtually ended by a system
at the Sixth International
Congress here.

At this meeting a system
perfected by which a speech

system. They appreciated especially,

The system was operated
by means of a microphone in front
of the speaker and headphones
each of the listeners. The speaker's

spoken, the three men translated
