


unit marched in review before Maj. Gen. Stephen O. Fuqua, chief of infantry, U. S. Army, Washington, who delivered the principal address. He also presented the corps with a gold star awarded by the army inspection board for the school year 1928-29, in recognition of a distinguished rating.

Among others who spoke were Dr. William Lowe Bryan, president of the university; Col. O. P. Robinson, commander of the I. U. Unit; The Rev. F. E. Kline, student Presbyterian pastor at Bloomington, and The Rev. Paul A. Beery, pastor of St. Charles Catholic church at Bloomington. The university band played.

The DePauw Infantry Corps passed in review preceding a salute to the dead, and a speaking program. Governor Harry G. Leslie proclaimed it a day for "observation by fitting exercises, emphasizing the value of peace and the patriotic devotion of those who made that peace possible."

More than 5,000 persons marched past the reviewing stand at the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' monument in an Armistice Day parade at Indianapolis.

Following the parade, services were held at the monument commemorating the "eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month" in 1918 when hostilities of the World War ceased.

Raymond S. Springer, Connersville, first state commander of the American Legion, was principal speaker. All statehouse officers in the city were ordered closed by Governor Leslie in recognition of the day as a legal holiday.

Lawrence county combined its Armistice Day ceremony with dedication of the new courthouse at Bedford. Major General William
