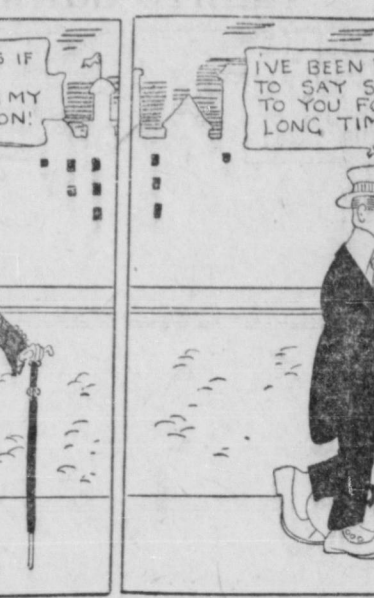

Bank in Tennessee Fails to Open Today

Knoxville, Tenn., Nov. 12.—(UP)—The Holston-Union National Bank failed to open today. Directors said that because of heavy withdrawals the bank's affairs had been placed in the hands of the comptroller of currency.

The institution one of three National banks here had deposits of \$1,79,123 as of September 24, and resources of \$16,200,359. The City of Knoxville had between \$350,000 and \$400,000 on deposit.

LANDIS LAUDS NATION'S IDEALS IN ADDRESS

"The fight now is against organized crime," Mr. Landis stated. "Court houses have become checking rooms for criminals to leave their troubles instead of places of justice. We must improve our judicial procedure and eliminate delays in prosecuting criminals who attempt to dictate to our courts and prevent justice being meted to the guilty," continued Mr. Landis.

"If I was to ask for the thing which would restore better conditions, bring about an observance of law, I would request a return of the old fashioned religion, Mr. Landis stated.

"The nation that forgets God is going to hell," declared Mr. Landis. He was loudly applauded when speaking on this subject and brought his remarks to a fitting climax with the assertion that it took a little more religion in the home to help correct things.

He told of a visit he had had with Thomas Edison and that the great inventor told him that America had just turned the first page in the never-ending book of life and invention and that greater things would be accomplished by the next generation.

He paid tribute to America's forces in the World war, to the
