NEW AMERICANS CELEBRATE WITH QUAINT CUSTOMS

Greeks and Jugo-Slavs In Montana Observe Late Christmas

Butte Mont. Jan. 7 — (UP) — This is Christmas day for some 7,000 Greeks and Jugo-Slavs of Butte and Anaconda, who are celebrating Christ's birth with quaint customs of the Balkan countries.

To these thousands of new Americans, members of the Greek Orthodox and Serbian Orthodox churches the nativity of the Christ is observed with prayer, feasting, peace making, and an historic "kissing game" in which old and young alike participate.

The Old World beliefs of some 15 Greek and Jugo-Slav fraternal organizations, interwoven with the religious observances, lend color and spirit to the celebration.

Early Ceremonies

While the day's ceremonies proper started at 2 A. M. yesterday was a day of strict fasting, while some families, more devout, abstained from certain foods for a more considerable period.

Following the church services, men, women and children greet one another with a whimsical, merry custom; a man, upon meeting a particular friend, kisses him three times, once upon either cheek and full upon the mouth.

Needless to say, bashful swains and shy maidens look forward eagerly to the end of the long services, to the time when kissing not only is allowed, but urged to promote lasting friendships among the young.

Another Custom

Another interesting custom concerns the preparation of the "Bady-nak," or Christmas fire logs, and the first visit of a friend after the church service.

Entering the house, the first visitor, known as a "Polaznik," seatters wheat over the threshold and announces in a clerical voice:

"Christ is born." "Truly He is born," replies the family in unison, whereupon the "Polaznik" places a coin upon one of the logs of the "Bady-nak" kisses the log and is given a present.

So strong is this custom and so literal the imprecations of ill to him denying absolution that should such an occasion arise, others would intervene to obtain the petitioner's forgiveness.

Historic difficulties threw the Orthodox observance of Christmas on Jan. 7 of the Gregorian calendar, since adopted by most Christian countries, but the Julian calendar still is used by many of Orthodox faith.
