Democratic Leader Stricken by Death

New Albany, Ind., Jan. 9.—(U.P.)—Heart disease caused the death here last night of Colonel Charles L. Jewett, 85, attorney, former speaker of the Indiana house of representatives, and for many years a leading democratic politician of southeastern Indiana. He was never married.

Jewett was a prominent railroad attorney, having been for 50 years district attorney for the Baltimore & Ohio railroad, and legal representative for the Monon, Pennsylvania and Southern railways for several years.
