In the matter of determining to issue bonds of Adams County, state of Indiana for the construction of a new bridge over the St. Marys River in said county.

Notice is hereby given to the taxpayers of Adams county, state of Indiana, that the proper legal officers of said municipality, at their regular meeting place on the 3rd day of March, 1931, finally determined to issue the bonds or other evidence of indebtedness of said county exceeding the sum of \$5,000.00.

The amount of bonds proposed is \$5,000.00 bearing interest at the rate of not to exceed 1 1/2% per annum; the net assessed value of all taxable property in taxing unit is approximately \$22,000,000.00 and the present indebtedness of said county not covered by existing levies is \$5,000.00.

The proceeds of said bond issue are to be used for the construction of a new bridge over the St. Marys River on the Henry Scheumann-Madison Road in the southwest quarter of section 15 in Preble township, in said county.

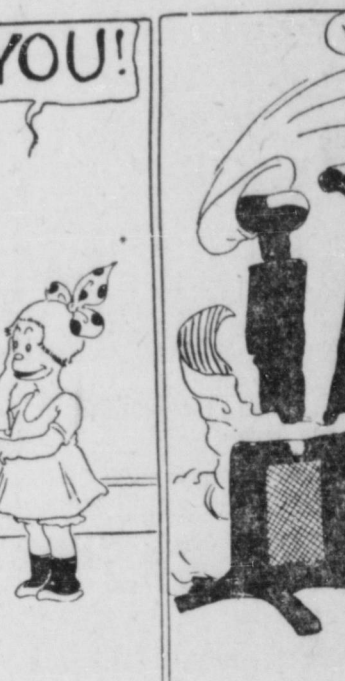
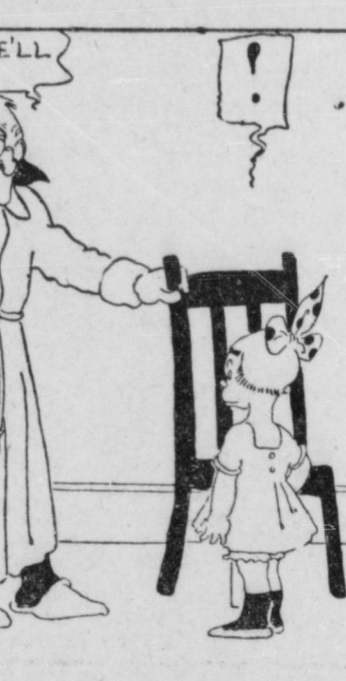
