direct to Managua, hoping to arrive late today in time to assume charge of relief work in the destroyed Nicaraguan capital.

Pan-American airways officials, meanwhile, released to the United Press today a radio message sent by pilot Archie Paschal while flying over Managua late yesterday in which Paschal reported "bodies being burned for lack of burial facilities."

Paschal's message read:

"Over Managua Terrible sight. City completely demolished. Fires raging, destruction beyond description. Six hundred known dead. Expected to reach 1,000 persons. Thousands injured. No water. People walking around in daze, looking for bodies of loved ones in ruins. Hundreds killed in hospitals. Marines doing wonderful work. City to be evacuated, bodies being burned for lack of burial facilities."

## ZEPPELIN NOT

### TO BLAME FOR

### BALLOT DEFEAT

#### Court Decides Against Losers in Saxony Election Appeal

Dresden, April 2.—(UP)—The administrative court here has decided that the curiosity which prompted polling officials in Oelsnitz, Saxony, to neglect their duty in favor of watching the soaring "Graf Zeppelin" is not sufficient cause for annulling a municipal election.

The bourgeois parties of Oelsnitz appealed to the court on the grounds that the "Graf's" overhead visit was responsible for their defeat at the elections Sept. 28, 1930. At the previous elections in November, 1928, the union of bourgeois parties in Oelsnitz had secured a majority of one seat in the town council; this election was cancelled on technical grounds. Upon its repetition in September, 1930, the tables were turned and the liberal and labor parties won a majority of one over their rivals.

On one of its periodic flights over Germany, Dr. Hugo Eckener's "Graf Zeppelin" flew over Saxony on the day when the citizens of Oelsnitz were electing their town council. The defeated and embittered bourgeois parties, in demanding the annulment of the election, insisted that members of most of the election boards, ignoring the ballot-urns they were supposed to guard, had rushed to the streets on hearing the whirr of the "Graf's" propellers. Blaming the Zeppelin for their political ill-fortune, the plaintiffs suggested that the ballot-boxes might have been stuffed while the election board members were admiring the passing airship.

The court refused to annul the election and Oelsnitz's new aldermen and the "left-wing" majority in the town council were told that they rightfully occupied their seats.
