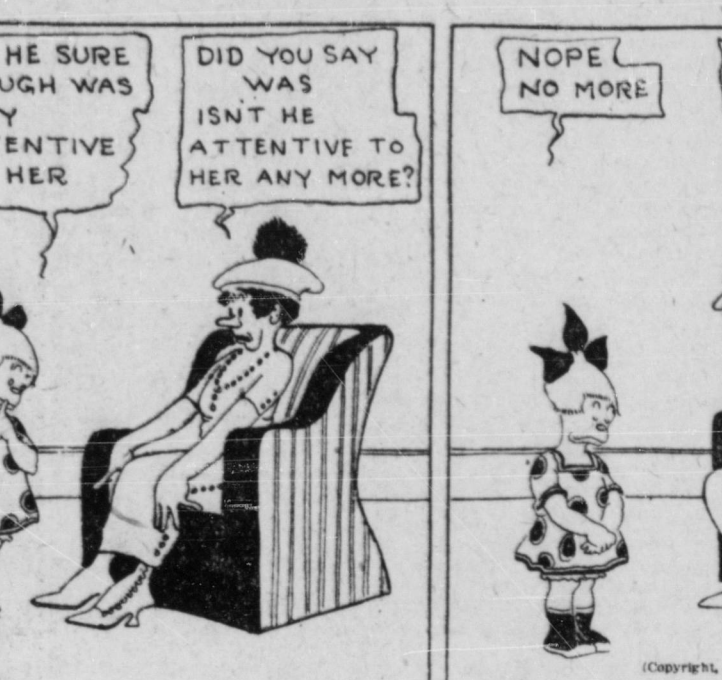

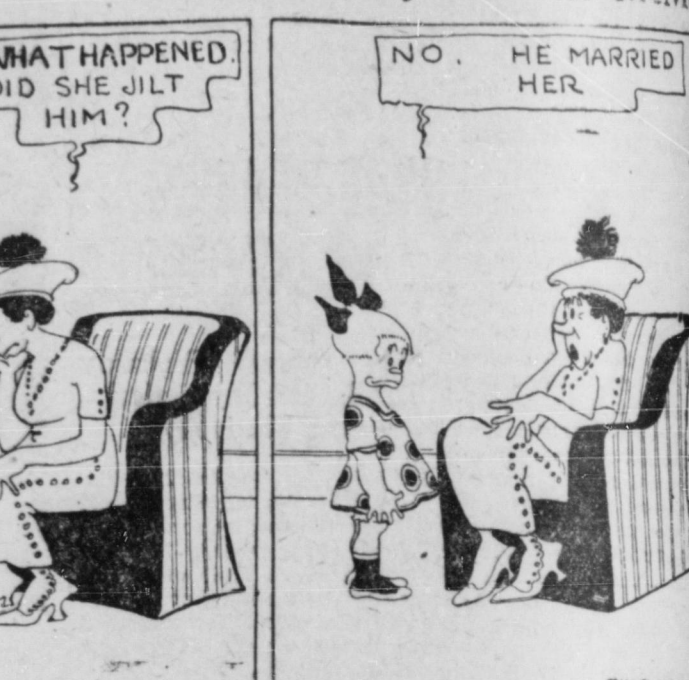

**HIGHWAY HEAD**

**GIVES BULLETIN**

**State Highway Commission Issues Traffic Bulletin**

Indianapolis, Ind., April 3.—(Special)—Paving has started on State Road 7 between Columbus and North Vernon and during such operation the detour via Ceymour over Roads 31 and 50 will be 32 miles, according to the state highway commission's traffic bulletin issued to day from the office of John J. Brown, director, Indianapolis to Madison traffic has the further choice of routing via Shelbyville and Greensburg with the entire distance paving excepting 18 miles between Versailles and Madison.

The traffic bulletin called attention to paving operations under way on Rd. 29 starting at the Marion county line. Rd. 7 paving project will complete pavement between Madison and Indianapolis, and Rd. 29 project completes a new paved route between Indianapolis and South Bend via Logansport and Rochester, road officials said.

Detours, length, and surface conditions of detours on the system at this time are described as follows:

Rd. 1. Detour from Brookville to Connersville account paving, is 23 1/2 miles.  
Rd. 2. Detour at west edge of

Rd. 6. Detour east of junction of Rd. 49 account overhead bridge construction, is 2 miles.  
Rd. 7. Detour between Columbus and North Vernon via Seymour over Rds. 31 and 50, account paving, is 32 miles. Detour at 4 miles south of Dupont for grading and paving bridge approaches, is 1.5 miles.

Rd. 15. Detour from Goshen to junction of Rd. 20, account paving is 8 miles.  
Rd. 18. Detour just west of Montpelier, account culvert construction is 6 miles. Detour from Montpelier to 1 mile north of Flat on Rd. 3, account bridge construction, is 9 1/2 miles.

Rd. 24. Detour from Wolcott east account of paving, is 4 miles.  
Rds. 24 and 30. Detour at east edge of Fort Wayne, account paving is 2 miles.

Rds. 24 and 53. Detour just south of Wolcott, account paving is 2 miles.  
Rd. 29. Detour from Marion Co. line to 3 1/2 miles north, account of paving is 5 1/2 miles. Detour from 5 miles south of Kirklin to Jct. with Rd. 28, for paving, is 18 miles.

Rd. 43. Detour as east edge of Wanatah, account overhead bridge construction, is 1 mile.  
Rd. 46. Detour from 2 miles west of Ellettsville to Spencer, account paving, is 9 miles.

Rd. 59. Detour in City of Washington, account street paving is 1.5 miles.  
Rd. 66. Detour from Hatfield to Rockport, account grading and paving, is 13 miles. (Narrow bridges; narrow road.)

Rd. 67. Detour at 2 miles north of Blount, account bridge out, is 2 miles.  
Roads not mentioned and parts of roads mentioned but not specified and all detours not otherwise described, are in good surface condition.

**WILL FURNISH WORK FOR NEEDY**

**Hundreds Will Be Employed by State in \$200,000 Expansion Program**

Indianapolis, April 3.—(UP)—Employment for hundreds of persons will be provided by the \$200,000 expansion program to be carried on in Indiana state parks and preserves, Director Richard Lieber of the state conservation department, announced today.

The improvement program is necessitated by the fact that more than 1,000,000 persons visited Indiana's parks and forest preserves last year, Lieber said. Half of the money to be spent on improvements was taken in receipts at the older parks it was said.

"Men with families will be given first choice when work starts," Lieber said, "and as so many workers will be needed it is expected a great swath will be cut in Indiana's unemployment ranks."

Projects to be worked on are: Erection of 50 sleeping rooms on the beach at Dunes park for operation in conjunction with a new dining room which will seat 200 people; construction of bath house and a recreation room; addition of eight sleeping rooms to Audubon Inn; clearing the beach of debris and landscaping and beautifying Waverly Beach parkway.

Building additional dining facilities at Pokagon park. Building a 30-room brick building with 200 capacity dining room, swimming pool, log cabin and camping facilities at McCormick's Creek canyon park.

Completion of 20 guest rooms addition to the 118 at Turkey Run park, repairing a wooden bridge extending bridge paths, erecting a barn and office, and decorating the Inn.

At Spring Mills park work will continue on the replica of a pioneer village as it appeared 100 years ago.

Two cottages, four rooms and larger camping grounds will be constructed at Muscatatuck park. A new observation field, state house, and augmented water supply will be built at Clifty Falls park. Water supply shelter houses and service buildings employing 100 people, will be worked on at Brown county park.

A boat house, water supply and sanitary sewer system will be constructed at Mounds park.
