INCREASED USE

OF WHEAT SEEN

Topeka, Kan., April 9—(UP)—

Within ten decades the United

States will need its present volume

of wheat production for domestic

use, C. Moran predicts in the April

issue of Capper's Farmer, agricultural

magazine.

He bases the forecast in an article

entitled "Tomorrow's Agriculture"

on the growth of population, in

which he sees no decline before

1950.

"Ten years from now," Moran

says "there will be 15,000,000 more

people to be fed in the United States

and an additional domestic market

for 75,000,000 bushels of wheat by

reason of population growth.

"Demand for nearly 1,000,000 extra

bushels of cotton in addition to an

increase in consumption resulting

from new uses for cotton will

develop. There will be corresponding

increases in the total home

consumption of meats, fruits, vegeta-

bles and other farm commodities."

The increasing demand for farm

products will lead to greatly improved

methods of production and har-

vesting, Moran believes.
