division of taxes are asked to come

in at once.

Call on the Auditor for errors and

no corrections. The Treasurer can

make no corrections.

The Treasurer will not be responsi-

ble for the penalty of delinquent tax-

es resulting from the omission of

tax-payer to state definitely on

what property they desire to pay.

In future years it may be found, by

what township or corporation it is

situated.

Persons owing delinquent taxes

should pay them at once, the law is

such that there is no option left for

the Treasurer to enforce the collec-

tion of delinquent taxes.

The annual sale of delinquent

lands and lots will take place on

the second Monday in February 1932,

at 9:30 A. M.
