# Look Before You Laugh! Guffaw Gives You Away

Columbia University Psychologist Declares  
Mode of Expressing Hilarity Is Sure  
Index to Character.



That your laugh indicates the type of humor you possess and is an outward sign of your true character, is the startling result of an experiment conducted by Dr. Polyxenia Kambourpoulou, psychologist at Columbia University, New York. The doctor arrived at her conclusions after an intensive study of one hundred students at Vassar College, each of whom kept a "humor diary" for the purpose of the experiment. The doctor declares that persons who express mirth with a "hee-hee" are merely indulging in the "hiss and sneer of a trickishly-gained victory." Those who laugh "Ho-ho!" says the doc, are actually scoffing in self-exaltation—like a rooster does the crowing, one presumes, after the hen has done the work. The only expression of glee which meets with the approval of Dr. Kambourpoulou is the old "Ha-ha!"—although that lends itself to more than one interpretation, such as "giving the boss the Ha-ha." However, as the test was made with the "gentle" sex as the subject, the not-so-gentle element can reasonably indulge in a good "Hee-hee! Ho-ho! or Ha-ha!" and still have a little hope of salvation.

New York, Dec. 1—When next you get that little tickle in the region of the left ventricle and feel your risibilities arising to the point where you will have to give audible expression to your hilarity, count ten and reach for a "Ha-Ha" instead of a "Hee-Hee" or a "Ho-Ho."

That you laugh means considerably more than an expression of mirth; that, in fact it is an infallible signpost that indicates your true character, is the startling theory of Dr. Polyxenia Kambourpoulou, psychologist at Columbia University, New York.

Of course we are all aware that the snicker of the Simon Legree villain, with the accompanying twirl of his hip shrubbery, is a sure portent of dirty work brewing, but Dr. Kambourpoulou goes further in her analysis of human cacklings and arrives at some disconcerting conclusions.

"Hee-hee," we always understood was either the empty giggle of the person who laughs at his own jokes, or the substitute for laughter used by self-conscious people who have a horror of drawing attention to themselves by letting out a hearty guffaw. But Dr. Kam—oh let's just call her the doctor—declares that those who laugh "Hee-hee" are indulging in the "hiss and sneer of trickishly gained victory." Further more, you can't according to the doc, disguise your "Hee-hee" by a little change in accent or intonation and make "Hey-hey" out of it. If you do it means that you are showing contempt for the worsted wretch now at your mercy.

Dr. Kam—er, the doc then goes on to shatter our illusions about "Ho-ho." Somehow, we have always associated this double explosion of mirth with the big, jovial, Faustian person, under whose belt reposes a big dinner and a bigger capacity for fun-making. But the doctor opens our eyes to the

perfidy of "Ho-hoers" with the dictum that their laugh is a "scoff of self-exaltation." In other words "Ho-ho! I am the great I AM. I put the salt in the ocean." The doc makes mention, also, of the "Hoo-hoo!" type of cackle, but we've never met anybody who laughed that way—unless the owls have been scoffing at us all these years when we thought they were just discussing the depression and things.

The only laugh to which Dr. Kambourpoulou hands a bouquet is the "Ha-ha." Although that mode of cackling is open to more than one interpretation—such as "giving the boss the Ha-ha!"—the doctor declares that such a laugh is characteristic of the gallant victor who enjoys a sure-hearted expression of generous mirth.

The Columbia psychologist reached her conclusions after an intensive study of one hundred students of Vassar College, who, under her direction, kept "humor diaries," in which they recorded every event which made them laugh for the period of one week.

Insofar as the test was made solely on the "gentle" sex, whose sense of humor differs from that of the "ungentle" sex in about the same degree as caviar differs from corned beef and cabbage, the male of the species will hardly take Dr. Kambourpoulou's experiment and resultant theory too much to heart. In fact, we can imagine the whole army of the "paunder" leaning back in their chairs and giving vent to a series of big "Hee-hee's, Hoo-ho's, and Ha-ha's."
