of congress that he places the utmost faith in the reconstruction finance corporation. In its simplest form, the purpose of the corporation will be to lend money on security on which private banks and private investors will not lend.

The house ways and means committee will meet to consider the democratic tariff bill. Democratic members planned to act on the bill yesterday, but republican members objected to the "haste," and after some argument, Chairman Collier invited representatives of the state, commerce, and treasury departments to appear today. It was regarded as doubtful that any representatives of these departments would appear, and the committee may act today. Democratic leaders are confident the bill will be passed by the end of the week, and possibly before.

The bill would strip the president of his tariff rate-making powers under the flexible provision of the
