We can't feel very favorable to a world tariff court as now being proposed by some of the fame hunters in Washington. Whatever tariff is needed for the United States and without any deals of any kind with any other nation would seem like sound sense at this time. And whatever we don't need ought to be knocked off right now.

The city of Decatur with a cash balance of \$122,000 is a thriving corporation. The funds show a gain even this year of \$18,000, certainly a splendid result and far different from some years ago when instead of a surplus we had a deficit as large as this. The present condition is due to the careful management of the present administration and of the last several prior to this one.

The Indiana Farm Bureau has guaranteed the two thousand acres needed to complete the requirements of those who will finance the Decatur plant and have agreed to secure this by January 15th. Indications are they will do so for from various directions come reports that numerous farmers who have not been solicited, desire to grow beets this year if the plant runs here. The acreage can be secured and if Col. Gallagher succeeds in interesting the men of finance, the mill here will operate next autumn, providing employment and a crop for the farmers. It will mean a turnover of a million dollars which in these days is something to shoot at.

For months President Hoover has been accumulating records from China, England and Australia to answer the vague charge in recent books that he made his money by bogus stock promotion schemes. He was ready to make public some of his material as far back as last summer. A Washington newspaperman was to have written a book on the basis of these records, settling forth the Hoover side of the story. Presidential counselors decided against the plan. They felt that the challenge made against the President in "The Great Mistake" by John Knox (a fake signature) was not sufficient to justify an answer. Publication of the latest book, "The Strange Career of Mr. Hoover Under Two Flags," by John Hamill, places a somewhat more serious light on virtually the same charges, with some new ones added for good measure.—McClure News Syndicate.

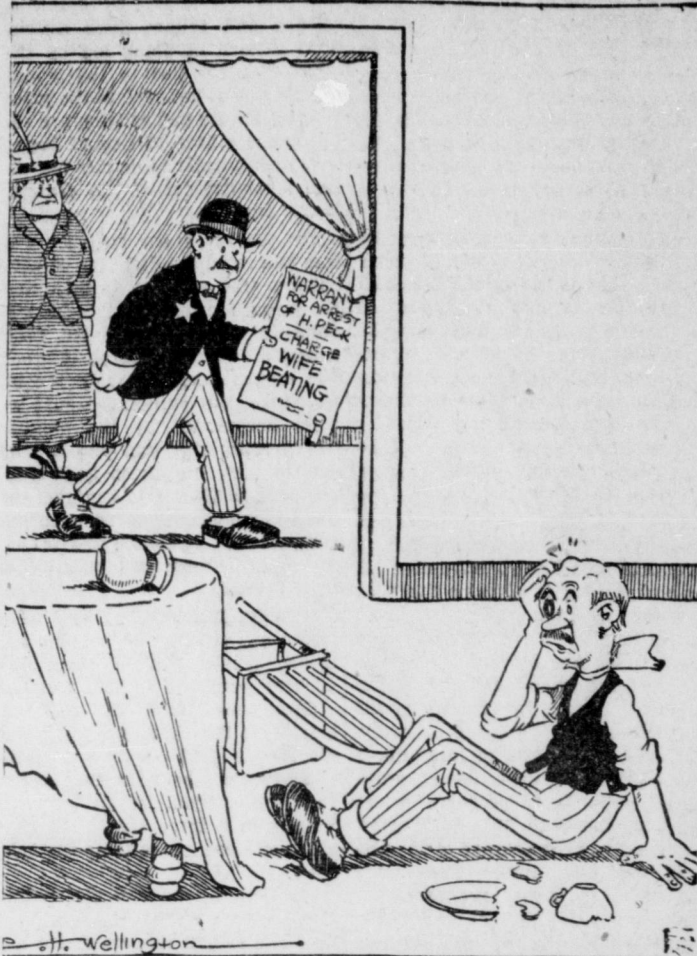

During the 12-year period, \$2,066,488.74 was invested in improvements to holdings, the report shows.

Richard Lieber, director of the department, referred to the financial audit as showing only a small part of the profit to the state from operation of the conservation division.
"It is impossible, even roughly, to estimate the good which the people have received from the department's endeavors," Lieber said.

"but it is possible to establish at least financial gain." He stressed that while the department was not to be self supporting, it was at satisfying a need for education, and instruction in conservation of natural resources of scenic beauty.
