

In 1361, Archbishop Thoresby began the chapel and presbytery in the early perpendicular style. Then the choir was rebuilt, and to conform with the alterations, the central tower was recased and changed to a perpendicularly lanter tower. The southwest tower was begun in 1432 and the northwest tower in 1470. With this, the church was completed as it stands today and was consecrated in 1472 by Archbishop Neville.

In 1840, the southwest tower suffered a fire which reduced it to a shell. However, it was restored without changing and looks today as it did before the damage.
