At Edwardsport it was at a height of 17.8 feet, with a likelihood of reaching 19 feet. At Mt. Carmel it was 3 of 4 feet over the flood stage at 16.3 feet. It appeared that it would rise to 17 feet.

The general level of the main fork of the White river was 16.8 feet this morning. The flood stage is 18 feet. Armington predicted that the water would rise to about 19 feet.

The St. Marys river was rising here today and only a slight rise was necessary to flood lowlands along the river channels. The water now is the highest it has been for many months. Part of the Decatur Country Club golf course is covered and the water was still reported to be rising late this afternoon.
