YOUTHFUL TEXAS ATTORNEY FACES GREAT TALENT

State Legal Head Seeks 17 Million From Oil Firms

Austin, Tex., Jan. 21.—(UP)—James V. Allred, former bootblack and newsboy, and now Texas' 32-year-old attorney general, will oppose some of the nation's ablest corporation lawyers here when 15 oil companies and associations are summoned to answer charges of violating anti-trust laws.

Allred will demand fines totaling \$17,850,000 from oil companies charged with conspiracy to fix prices and throttle small competi-
tors, and otherwise violate Texas trade laws.

When Allred still was in short pants, his father summoned his five sons before him. He confided a hope that one would become a lawyer.

Since that day each of the five has served either as county or district attorney.

Allred's first act as attorney general of Texas was to write a letter to his parents, thanking them for the opportunities they had afforded him.

His attack on large oil companies is set forth in a 132-page petition. The document in itself is a romantic story of how certain foreign oil corporations, after being driven out of the state, returned to do business through subsidiaries. For their defense, the oil companies are expected to secure the foremost legal talent available. They will represent assets worth hundreds of millions. Much of this capital has been invested in thousands of miles of pipe lines, countless oil wells, storage tanks, refineries, office buildings, fleets of tank cars and lengthy chains of filling stations.

Boonville, Ind., Jan. 22.—(UP)—A court here will be called upon to decide whether Mrs. Lillie Hutson fired three shots at her estranged husband because of their differences or because, as she reported, he was trying to steal her chickens.

Cannelton, Ind., Jan. 22.—(UP)—A charge of manslaughter was on file here today against Hettie Van Hoosier, 20, Bristol, as the result of the death of Evelyn Strifke, 15, who died of a bullet wound suffered at the Van Hoosier home.

Miss Van Hoosier told authorities

that she was examining a pistol when it accidentally discharged, the bullet striking Miss Strifke.

Oscar Teberhough and Floy Lynn who were present when the Strifke girl was shot, were released on bond pending further investigation.

Minister Outstanding

Whiting, Ind., Jan. 22.—(UP)—Rev. John Lach, pastor of the immaculate Conception church here, today was regarded by Slovak-Americans as the man who accomplished most for the Slovak people during 1931. Rev. Lach received the greatest number of votes in a Nation-wide poll conducted by Slovak newspapers to determine which member of their nationality performed the most outstanding service during the past year.

Deer Failed to Roam

Lansing, Mich.—(UP)—Four deer, "tagged" by state officers to learn their migratory habits, were killed by hunters during the past season. The deer had not roamed far from the scene of their first capture, officials of the state conservation department said. One buck was killed less than one mile from the point where he was released.
