Penitentiary School

Folsom Prison, Calif., Feb. 17. (UPI) School bells again are ringing in Folsom's "schoolhouse," scene of the bloody Thanksgiving Day riot of 1927.

The ban on educational privileges for the convicts, in effect since the riot, has been lifted by Warden Court Smith. Cessation of educational activities at the prison was caused by crowded conditions, Smith said, necessitating the use of the "schoolhouse" as sleeping quarters.

Completion of a new cell block recently has relieved this condition, the warden announced.

STARS AND BARS FLOWN IN TEXAS

Austin, Tex., Feb. 12. (UPI) Stars and bars of the Confederacy flew from the flagstaff of the state capitol here on Gen. Robert E. Lee's birthday this year. Old-timers say it was the first time they have seen such a display of the flag of the South. In the days of the Confederacy the present state capitol had not been erected.

Above the Confederate flag was flown the Lone Star flag of the Republic of Texas. Four other flags would have been displayed if all the flags of governments that have ruled Texas were used. They are Spain, France, Mexico and now the United States.

The flag of the Republic of Texas is flown daily over the capitol. It now is designated as the state flag.

During the World War it was hung under the Stars and Stripes.
