Extradition Discussed

Indianapolis, March 17.—(UPI)—
Commissioner Dewitt Billman, repre-
senting Governor Louis L. Em-
erson of Illinois, was to come here
today to confer with local police
regarding extradition of William H.
Blackburn, 20, Oak Park, Ill.

Blackburn is wanted here as a
suspect in the shooting and robbery
of J. Russell Gardner, who was
attacked by a hitch-hiker whom he
had aided last January 29. Black-
burn purportedly has been identified
by two persons who witnessed the
attack on the outskirts of Indianapolis.

Illinois authorities were repre-
sented as saying the extradition
will not be granted unless stronger
evidence is introduced.

Local police were quoted as say-
ing they have no more evidence
than was presented by an extradition
hearing two weeks ago.


