## JAPAN TROOPS QUIT SHANGHAI

### Armed Troops Withdrawn Today; Peace Diplomats See Settlement

Shanghai, March 21—(UP)—Japan began withdrawal of her military and naval forces from Shanghai today as foreign diplomats predicted resumption of peace conferences would lead to a definite truce between China and Japan.

Japanese officials announced that part of the third fleet sailed for Japan from Woosung Sunday. Three transports, believed to be carrying between 3,000 and 4,000 troops, sailed today. Further sailings of two or three ships a day were scheduled during the week.

Japanese officials announced that a destroyer squadron, part of a cruiser division and part of an aircraft division had left Woosung for Japan. Among the ships was the cruiser Ohi, which was the target for a mine while anchored off the Shanghai waterfront.

The Japanese said they were ready to resume peace negotiations this afternoon. It was indicated that both China and Japan would demand modifications of the draft peace proposals submitted to Nanking and Tokyo.

proposed in the bill to raise the lost revenue. He said the committee would be compelled to consider increased postal rates, a tax on bank checks, an automobile tax, and possibly increased taxes on cosmetics. He said the insurgent amendments already agreed to by the house over his protest would not yield anything like the \$200,000,000 which their proponents claim.

He said he had received estimates from the treasury department indicating that the whole Lacordia plan would fall \$530,000,000 short of furnishing the necessary revenue.

The insurgents were not greatly impressed with the new concessions. Rep. Doughton, Dem., N.C., indicated his forces would continue to pursue the policy of taking everything they can get in the way of exemptions and concessions and then opposing the tax on the final vote.

At his regular press conference today Speaker Garner declined to say whether he would personally take the floor to speak for the sales tax when it is brought up for consideration.

"That is a matter to be decided when the time comes," Garner said.

In the past, when the house leadership has been threatened with a serious defeat speakers occasionally abandoned the rostrum to make a personal appeal. Reports have said that Garner contemplated such a step.

Editor Democrat:

This industrial crisis through which we are now passing is certainly bringing its problems. The latest to the front is the school problem. This problem was brought on directly by the fight for tax reduction. Now some folks might say it is a good thing there is a school problem as our schools are costing too much money. I believe that is true. If we look the question squarely in the face "What price education?" we are up against it.

Some townships in this county are facing a six months school term for next winter. That might suit a good many farmers. I could see my youngsters a month to advantage in the corn field myself. The Indiana law limits the levy for tuition (which is teachers' salaries) to 75 cents. Many townships in northern Indiana are almost there now and when the new apportionment on property goes in to effect this summer with a 30 or 35 per cent drop, the levy will go up accordingly like a teeter board.

The only remedy would be reduced teachers' salaries. But there is another Indiana law guaranteeing a minimum wage for teachers below which a trustee dare not go. Now if the teachers are as patriotic as I recently heard a speaker say why do they not get together and agree to donate about 25% of their salary back to the school corporation?

Now of course there are other ways around this school question. One is if the legislature meets previous to the hiring of teachers

### Immortal Work of Art

"The Death of Socrates" painted in 1785 and exhibited in the Paris salon in 1787, is the work of Jacques Louis David. It is one of the four paintings classed as the artist's masterpieces and shows the Greek philosopher about to drink poison in a well surrounded by his disciples. Sir Joshua Reynolds, who saw the painting at Paris, described it as the greatest effort of art since the Sistine chapel and the Stanze of Raphael. In 1812 Napoleon tried to purchase it, but was not successful.


