CULL FLOCKS, AGENT URGES

"The results of the survey on the prevalence of tuberculosis infection in poultry flocks of Adams county, emphasize the need of culling flocks and disposing of the laying hens as soon as they go into the molt." County Agent L. E. Archbold stated in commenting on the situation. "This measure should be adopted both for reasons of economy and the prevention of losses by this dread disease."

"Following of that recommendation practice means that to assure a laying flock this fall, the brooding of chicks should take place this spring. It is suggested that enough chicks be brooded to fill capacity of brooding equipment."

"While eggs are low priced, the prices of poultry are at about the same levels as they were in 1929 and the poultry has contributed very materially to the upkeep of the farm homes. A number of poultry dealers have informed us that they have averaged 75 checks a week for \$3.99 or less in payment for poultry. This shows that the flocks have been depleted to meet the current family needs."
